TO THE VOTERS OF HOLT COUNTY

The State Banking situation is hurting all lines of business and the people are entitled to relief. We know now that the Bank Guarantee Law was a "Noble Experiment," and has proven a failure and been discarded in Washington, North and South Dakota, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Mississippi, and it has certainly been a failure in Nebraska.
