Grower of Prize Carnations Is Raiser of National Champion Jersey Milk Production

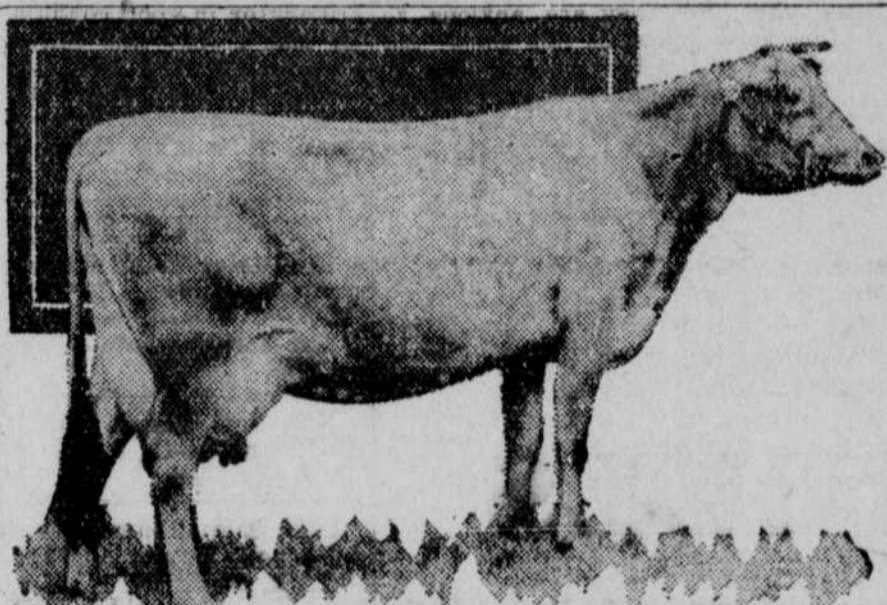
Milford, Mass. — (NEA) — For 34 years a grower of choice carnations and now W. D. Howard is owner of the national champion Jersey Cow!

Howard's Ida Clifton Ethel, a purebred Jersey, is now champion senior three-year-old Jersey for both milk and butterfat production, and she has Howard to thank for it. For it was only through his hard work that she was developed into the leader of her class.

Taking time from his florist business and other duties, the cow's owner carefully watched her diet and kept her stalls and pasture immaculately clean. He kept accurate checks on her production, and experimented with her feed until he had that which gave the best results. And the cow rewarded, starting the new year by completing the highest Jersey records for milk and butterfat production ever made in America in the senior three-year-old class.

Eight Thousand Quarts!
With her yield of 18,151 pounds of milk, the equivalent of 8,433 quarts a year, she surpassed the record of Lass 66th of Hood Farm Massachusetts, who completed her record in 1915, and with her butterfat yield of 1,030.79 pounds, the equivalent of 1,288 pounds of butter, she took championship honors from St. Mawes Led's Prode, an Oregon Jersey whose record was finished in 1925.

Eight different supervisors from the state agricultural colleges of Massachusetts and Connecticut checked the production of the cow



during the year of test. In the last month of her record year, which was the thirteenth month of the lactation, she produced 99 pounds of butterfat, more than any month during the test.

Champ in Three Years
Howard purchased the champion Jersey at an auction sale in 1927. He added this cow to his five-year-old herd and had her only a short

time before he realized she was of championship quality.

In addition to raising prize cattle, Howard has won many honors in flower shows. He has won the sweepstakes prize of the American Carnation Society a number of times and in addition has been unusually successful at the International Flower Show held annually in New York.

Howard, S. D. — Bundle racks, grain wagons, threshing machines and other traveling machinery used in the threshing season are common means of spreading weeds the Miner county weed committee has found.

Acting on this idea R. O. Swanson of Canova, chairman of the committee organized this spring to combat spread of noxious weeds suggested to S. W. Jones, county agent, that farmers of the county be warned.

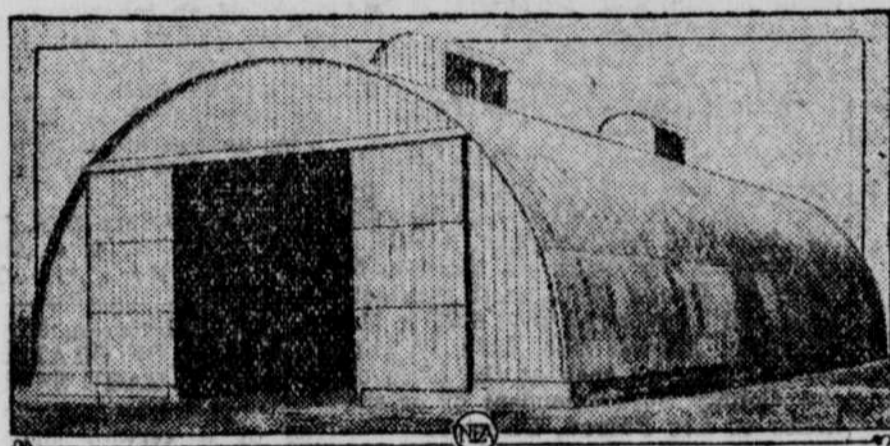
The county agent sent 1,250 circular letters, one to every farmer in the county, carrying the suggestion that every wagon, rack and machine be swept thoroughly before leaving each farm where threshing operations have been conducted.

Farmers were advised to sweep each wagon before driving it home at night to avoid carrying home seeds of Canada thistle, quack grass, creeping jenny and others that may be caught in the cracks and crevices. Each farmer was urged to carry a broom on every rack, wagon and threshing machine.

LINE UP FOR WHEAT MARKET

Warm Poultry Houses Pay Farmers in Egg Production

Brookings S. D. — Poultry houses kept above freezing temperatures during the winter months repay the farmer in increased egg production, according to preliminary experiments conducted during the last three winters at South Dakota State college by Prof. G. L. Stevenson.

No attempt was made to keep the poultry house warm, merely above freezing. The method of heating

was by the brooder stove, used with young chicks in the spring.

Smaller amounts of feed were necessary for the flocks kept in the heated house than for those kept in the unheated. The difference in the feed cost just about offset the cost of fuel, with the increased egg production a net gain.

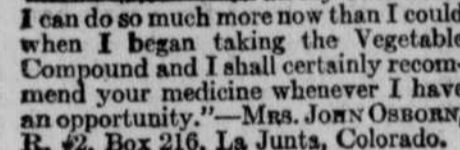
