ANTHRAX APPEARS IN HOLT COUNTY

Only Affected Herd Quarantined To Prevent Further Spread

An outbreak of one of the most destructive and dreaded diseases of the animal industry has made its appearance on the Paul Schwisow farm located at the southwest corner of O'Neill. The case was reported by Dr. Bennett and Laboratory diagnosis was made by Dr. Brown which was confirmed by the State Laboratories where a culture was sent. A strict quarantine is in force in hopes of preventing further spread of the disease.

Live stock owners should be on their guard and watch their herds closely. While it is chiefly limited to cattle, horses, hogs and sheep it may be readily transmitted to goats, cats, mice, rabbits and dogs, fowls being the least susceptible. It may even attack man. The symptoms of the disease are few, an animal may be apparently well at night and is found dead in the morning having died without a struggle. Blood from the animals turns black and does not clot. Dead animals should not be skinned, as there is great danger of the parties skinning them contracting the disease and also spreading it from the hide. Dead animals should be promptly destroyed by burning or burying in quicklime and not moved from the place they fell, as moving them only tends to further contaminate the ground. The anthrax spore can live in the ground as long as 25 years and still readily start another outbreak. Hogs fed an anthrax carcass die within a few hours.

So far as Mr. Schwisow has only lost one cow and about 20 head of hogs. From where the disease made its appearance is a mystery.
