ANTHRAX APPEARS IN HOLT COUNT

Only Affected Herd Quarantined

Prevent Further Spread

An outbreak of one of the most structive and dreaded diseases of animal industry has made its appe ance on the Paul Schwisow farm cated at the southwest corner O'Neill. The case was reported by Bennett and Laboratory diagnos was made by Dr. Brown which w confirmed by the State Laborator where a culture was sent. A str quarantine is in force in hopes preventing further spread of the d ease.

Live stock owners should be on the guard and watch their herds close While it is chiefly limited to catt horses, hogs and sheep it may readily transmitted to goats, ca mice, rabbits and dogs, fowls being 265 the least susceptible. It may even 985 attact man. The symptoms of the disease are few, an animal may be 217 apparently well at night and is found 113 dead in the morning having died without a struggle. Blood from the ani-93 mals turns black and does not clot. Dead animals should not be skinned, as there is great danger of the parties skinning them contracting the disease and also spreading it from the hide. 383 Dead animals should be promptly des- I stroyed by burning or burrying in A quicklime and not moved from the place they fell, as moving them only B tends to further contaminate the ground. The anthrax spore can live in the ground as long as 25 years and still readily start another outbreak. IZAAK WALTON LEAGUE Hogs fed an anthrax carcass die within a few hours.

So far as Mr. Schwisow has only lost one cow and about 20 head of hogs. From where the disease made September 12th, 13th and 14th. its appearance is a mystery.
