THE STATE CONVENTION
Izaak Walton League
HOLD SUCCESSFUL MEETING

warmth of the weather in Nebraska at that period.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Nebraska Division of the Izaak Walton League in state convention assembled recommend that legislation be passed amending the opening date for the migratory bird season to October 1st, and

WHEREAS, the present game laws of the state of Nebraska lists the turtle dove as a game bird and has an open season in which this bird is hunted as game, and

WHEREAS, we do not believe the turtle dove can hardly be classified as a game bird and

WHEREAS, the present open season is undoubtedly being used by unprincipled hunters as a subterfuge for killing truly game birds out of appointed season

BE IT RESOLVED that the Nebraska Division of the Izaak Walton League recommend the passage of legislation taking the turtle dove out of the game bird classification and including these birds in the protected song bird list. And

WHEREAS, reports from a large area in central Nebraska where prairie chicken and grouse propagate would indicate that these birds are just at the present time getting a good start and further that the opening of the season at the close of the present closed season thereon would result in the undoing of the benefits now starting to be derived from the closed season we are now observing,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Nebraska Division of the Izaak Walton League recommend to the next session of the Nebraska State Legislature the passage of a measure extending the closed season on these birds for an additional two years, and

WHEREAS, it seems a practical impossibility to enforce any kind of regulation on the hunting of bull frogs other than that of a continuous closed season, and

WHEREAS, said bull frogs constitute a very valuable addition to the fish food of our waters,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Nebraska Division of the Izaak Walton League recommend the passage of a measure permanently closing the season on bull frogs, and

WHEREAS, the National Executive Board of the Izaak Walton League of America adopted a resolution on July 23rd, 1930, to sponsor legislation, in Congress and the different states, that would make the necessary amendments to Federal and State Water Impounding laws in order to safeguard scenic, historic and wild life values,

BE IT RESOLVED, That we, the Nebraska Division of the I. W. L. A. are in entire accord with the proposed amendments to our State and Federal Water Impounding Laws as suggested in this resolution and hereby pledge our active support in behalf of such legislation in order that scenic and other public values may be safeguarded, and

WHEREAS, it is a part of the program of all Waltonism to stimulate all outdoor activity, tree planting and other natural enhancement and conservation projects,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Nebraska Division of the I. W. L. A. hereby places itself on record as favoring a system of county parks to be financed in the counties in which said parks are located, and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the resolutions committee that the best interests of the Nebraska Division of the Izaak Walton League can be best served during the coming year by combining the offices of the secretary and treasurer of the Nebraska Division,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Nebraska Division in its annual convention now assembled, elect the same person to the office of treasurer as is elected at said convention to the office of secretary by separate ballot for each office for the coming year, and

WHEREAS, a great amount of game fish is now being lost through the fact that the Platte River does not have a continuous flow during the dry summer months at points above the entrance of the Loup to said Platte River and the biological survey department of the state of Nebraska now has before it a program for impounding additional flood waters to be used for irrigation, and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of the members of this convention that this program will result in a more continuous flow of water through that portion of the river which now goes dry each summer,

BE IT RESOLVED, that it is the sense of this convention that this is a most important reclamation and conservation effort and should have the wholehearted and vigorous support of the Nebraska Division and that we do hereby pledge said support and co-operation of the Nebraska Division to the completion of this program, and

WHEREAS the gap between farmers, ranchmen and sportsmen becomes increasingly more difficult to bridge due to the unsportsmanlike conduct of some hunters and fishermen who have not had the advantage of education along these proper lines,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that education work to the end that destruction of private property by hunters and fishermen and disinclination to observe the property rights of others cease and that it be designated that one of the earnest purposes of the Nebraska Division for the coming year be further education along these lines to the end that the cause of outdoor recreation be not destroyed through the ignorance and ruthlessness of a few of the people enjoying same, and

WHEREAS, the fountain head of inspiration for greater and more con-
