DEDICATE BEST RURAL SCHOOL

Structure in Dodge County, Nebraska Has Modern Conveniences

Lincoln, Neb.—(Special)—The dedication address for the new Bellview school in district No. 42, Dodge county, was delivered by State Superintendent Taylor, who says the building is the best that is possible for a rural school. It was erected at a cost of \$9,075 to replace one destroyed in May of this year by a tornado.

The building has all modern conveniences consisting of finished basement, electric light plant, a deep well with pressure water system, drinking fountains, inside toilets and provision for a library and a special closet for the pupils' lunch boxes and packages.

Instead of issuing bonds, a building fund was created with the expectation of paying for the building in five years.

The school is in one of the wealthiest districts in Dodge county, having a valuation of more than \$600,000.

NEBRASKA TEACHERS TO HEAR NOTED EXPLORER

Lincoln, Neb.—(UP)—Sir Hubert Wilkins, noted Australian explorer who plans to reach the north pole by a submarine trip under the ice soon, will be one of the lecturers who will speak before meetings of the Nebraska State Teachers association October 29 to November 1. The state will be divided into districts, the gatherings to be held at Lincoln, Omaha, Norfolk, Grand Island, McCook and Scottsbluff.

Others who may address the meetings if preliminary plans are completed include Will Irwin, famed journalist, Frederick Warde, Shakespearean actor, and Arthur Guiterman, poet and president of the Authors' Fellowship league.

A host of the nation's most prominent educators will be present at the sessions, including men famed in nearly every field of work connected with school life.

PLAYED IN BAND WHEN ANDREE SAILED AWAY

Wakefield, Neb.—(Special)—Eric Eklund, leader of the Wakefield band, was a member of the Swedish army band at Gutenberg, Sweden, in 1897 which played as the ill-fated Andree polar expedition started off for the arctic. Eklund's army service was ended in 1901 and three years later he came to America.

RAILWAY COMMISSION HEARS PHONE COMPANY'S PLEA

Hartington, Neb.—(Special)—The Cedar County Farmers Telephone company held a hearing here on the application before the state railway commission asking permission to increase its rates. The commission was represented by Hugh Drake, accompanied by Mr. Taylor, an employe of the state auditing department, and Miss Smith, a stenographer. B. Ready, president, and Otto Emerson, secretary and treasurer of the telephone company, appeared on its behalf. The increase in rates is asked for on account of installing, recently, equipment costing \$12,000. The matter was taken under advisement by the commission and a decision is expected soon.

The railway commission also heard the complaint of B. W. Wright of Wayne against Fred Nuttelman of this city, owner of the Hartington-Sioux City bus, charging reckless driving. Mr. Wright charged that September 13 Mr. Nuttelman tried to force his bus off the highway into a ditch, when both buses were carrying passengers. Witness were the passengers of the two buses at the time of the alleged reckless driving. The commission took the matter under advisement and a ruling will be handed down soon.

WAYNE COUNTY MAN WANTS GUARDIAN DISMISSED

Lincoln, Neb.—(Special)—An appeal has been filed with the supreme court by Robert Fenske from a ruling by Judge Chase of the district court of Wayne county denying his request that his guardian be dismissed. Ernest A. Strait was named by the court as his guardian in April, 1924, and Fenske claims that the sole reason for this was the fact that he was addicted to the use of liquor. He insists that he has not touched intoxicants since February, 1929, and that he now is a temperate man and a law abiding citizen. Fenske was denied a jury trial and says the evidence did not justify the judge's ruling that the guardian continue in charge. A number of relatives were named as defendants. He claims to be competent to manage his own affairs and property which originally consisted of farm mortgages amounting to \$40,000, a part of which have been collected.

Raleigh, N. C.—Selection of Mrs. B. N. Sykes of Harrellsville as a master home-maker of North Carolina has given the state its first "master farm family."

Lincoln, Neb.—Mrs. Elery Davis of Lincoln Thursday was re-elected president of the Nebraska State League of Women Voters at the close of its 10th annual convention here.

Other officers elected are: Mrs. Charles H. Dietrich, of Hastings, first vice president; Mrs. R. E. Holmberg, of Hastings, second vice president; Mrs. Clinton John, Grand Island, third vice president; Mrs. E. L. Marty, of Lincoln, secretary, and Mrs. George Abel, of Lincoln, treasurer.

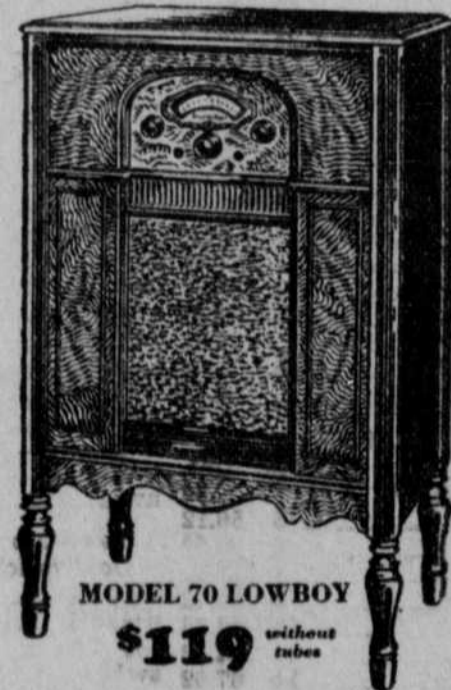
