During the electrical storm Wednesday morning the lightning followed the electrical wire into the Frank Campbell residence, destroying the fuse block and several light bulbs. Mrs. Golden who occupies a part of the Campbell residence lost her hearing for a few hours, from the explosion. The shade on a table lamp in the Edward Campbell residence caught fire but no other damage was done to these homes.

Mrs. Luella A. Parker, Superintendent of the Holt County schools, is chairman of the county superintendent's section of the district No. 3, Nebraska State Teachers Association which will hold its annual convention in Norfolk, October 29 to November 1. Mrs. Parker will preside over the meetings of this department, for which she has arranged an interesting program. She served in this capacity for the convention a year ago.

The open season on pheasants in Holt County will begin October 23rd. Many farmers have posted their places against the pheasant hunters and are very indignant about the opening of the season in this county, claiming that the birds are not plentiful and that the ten day open season will wipe out the birds if they are not protected; other land owners say that they do not want every hunter shooting on their land; some of them will permit hunting providing that the hunters ask permission. Hunters should exercise precaution in going on a farmer's land, and see that the gates are closed and that no damage is done by him.

The land and cattle sale held at the Ditch Camp Ranch last Saturday by the heirs of the Rankin estate drew a crowd of at least fifteen hundred strangers from all parts of the central west; cars were here from Colorado, Wyoming, Kansas, South Dakota, Iowa, Illinois, Ohio, Minnesota, as well as from many counties in Nebraska. The cattle sold fairly well and were purchased in carload lots by parties at various points in northern Nebraska. The land brought just fair prices; more than 8,000 acres went through the sale ring. The sale of this ranch and its passage to new owners will close the business in this vicinity of a company that has been a great asset to Holt county; they have brought many thousands of dollars to Holt county during the years they have been feeding cattle, and their passing will be felt by O'Neill.

M., and at that time publicly opened and read for One Bridge over the Niobrara River near Grand Rapids, Nebraska, and incidental work on the Grand Rapids State Aid Bridge Project.
