J. S. ENNIS WILL MAKE AN EXCELLENT SHERIFF

The addition of the auto license and the drivers license to the regular work of the office entails a great deal of additional business that must be cared for without delay; in order to dispatch this work on time competent help must necessarily be employed; this help must be kept on the job throughout the year; there are slack periods during the year when the office force is not operating to capacity but there are many months in the year that the help is required to remain a number of hours after closing time in order that the work might be taken care of on time; this is a phase of the matter that does not come to the attention of the people generally; everyone is prone to judge hastily, at times, upon matters of which they are not thoroughly informed; we have heard remarks to the effect that there is surplus help employed in this office; this is a mistake. There is now only one more clerk employed in the treasurer's office than was employed in that office twenty-five years ago. The collections of the office are now about three times as great as they were at that time and the labor of the office has doubled at least.

In 1911 there were 1926 checks written by the treasurer; in 1912 there were 1929 checks written; for the twelve months ending June 30, 1930—the close of the last fiscal year—there were 3501 checks written. The business of the office in all lines has increased proportionately.

COUNTY CLERK PORTER A POPULAR CANDIDATE

Those who have had business to transact in the county clerk's office know with what efficiency it has been handled. Might as Well Say "BOY SCOUT TRUST"

A newspaper article printed in Omaha Thursday quoting Senator Norris attempts to involve the Nebraska Power Company in politics.

In commenting upon the testimony before the Nye Senatorial Expenditure Investigating Committee that Walter W. Head, Chairman of the Board of Directors of this company gave some of his personal funds to conduct a poll of republican voters in Nebraska, Senator Norris is quoted as saying:

"Walter Head was formerly president of the Nebraska Power Company. He is now chairman of the board of directors of that company." Later in the statement Senator Norris is quoted as saying that the Nebraska Power Company "is a part of the power trust."

Mr. Head is now president of the Foreman-State National Bank of Chicago, is chairman of the board of the Omaha National Bank and has long been active in republican politics in Nebraska.

An attempt to involve the Nebraska Power Company in politics because of Mr. Head's political activities might just as reasonably be applied to any other of his many and worthy interests.

Mr. Head is a director of the International Y. M. C. A., a director of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, a director of the New York Life Insurance Company, president of the Boy Scouts of America, a director of several banks and many other institutions, and a farm owner.

Instead of singling out the Nebraska Power Company and erroneously claiming that it is part of a "Power Trust," reference might just as reasonably have been made to the "Railroad Trust," or to the "Insurance Trust," or to the "Banking Trust," or even to the "Y. M. C. A. Trust," or to the "Boy Scout Trust," or to the "Farm Trust."

As a matter of fact, any statement that there is a "Power Trust" in Nebraska, we emphatically deny. There are, in Nebraska alone, many separate and distinct Power Companies with separate and distinct ownership and management.

The Nebraska Power Company is not in politics. It has not contributed one cent either for or against the election of Senator Norris. The implication that this company has anything to do with the Senatorial election in Nebraska is without foundation.

The sole business of the Nebraska Power Company is to sell electricity to its customers at the lowest possible rates and to furnish the best service we know how to furnish. We believe we are doing this to the satisfaction of our customers.
