### AN OPEN LETTER TO SENATOR HITCHCOCK

O'Neill, Nebraska,  
October 26, 1930

Hon. Gilbert M. Hitchcock,  
Omaha, Nebraska,  
Dear Sir:

Those of us who supported you in your first two campaigns for Senator are at times asking why we are opposing you now and supporting Senator Norris. I am sure you are well convinced that my opposition to you is not on any personal grounds. During your first two campaigns for Sen-

ator you had no more loyal supporter in Nebraska than I was. I have never asked you for a favor, even to the extent of getting any friend of mine appointed to office. It is on your record as United States Senator during your second term that I now oppose you. It is not necessary to go into a multitude of your votes. While there are many of these votes during your second term that I disapprove of, still the one question above all that I want to present in this letter is the fact that you voted for the Esch-Cummins railroad law, and Senator Norris voted against it. It is the worst railroad law for the people that was ever passed by Congress, or even by any State Legislature. I will tell you briefly a few good reasons why.

Formerly we shipped hay for \$2.00 a ton from Atkinson in this county, which is quite a hay shipping point. It now costs us \$3.30. Under this Esch-Cummins law, our State Legislature, or Railway Commission have absolutely no power to regulate railroad rates.

Take the case of Union Pacific railroad. When that railroad was foreclosed upon in the United States Court, they re-organized it and the inside bunch paid in \$40.00 a share for the railroad stock. That stock sold on Saturday for \$195.00 a share. The difference between \$40.00 and \$195.00 represents wind and water. It is what is known as "watered stock." And why is it bringing this price of \$195 a share? It is because under the Esch-Cummins law, the Union Pacific is permitted to charge freight rates high enough to the people of Nebraska, so that they can pay dividends not only on the \$40.00 a share invested but on \$155.00 a share, wind and water.

You talk much, Senator, of having our Senators represent Nebraska. I wonder who it was that was standing up for the people of Nebraska on the day when you, as United States Senator, voted for a law under which the people are paying dividends on \$155.00 a share on watered stock, or was it Senator Norris who voted against it?

Take the case of the Burlington railroad. That stock could be bought at \$60.00 a share. Jim Hill and the Morgans fixed up an organization plan, under which it was turned at \$200.00 a share, and freight rates charged high enough to pay on \$200 a share. That condition still exists and will continue to exist as long as we have the Esch-Cummins law. Now, in addition to paying dividends on this Burlington railroad at this enormous unjust rate, they made so much more money that on one occasion they "cut the melon" of ten million dollars and on another occasion fifteen million dollars. It will not be long until they are ready to "cut another melon." All this is done and will continue under this dishonest Esch-Cummins law. What Senator was standing up for Nebraska, when that law was passed? Was it you, Senator Hitchcock, who voted for it? Or was it Senator Norris who voted against it?

Entirely outside of your record in the Senate, there are reasons why that owing to your attitude and that of your newspaper in this campaign tens of thousands of us could not vote for you.

Governor Weaver appointed a fine young man, Hugh Drake, to a position on the Railway Commission. He is absolutely square and all right. But your newspaper has been publishing articles that he was into the deal to get a grocery clerk at Broken Bow, named George W. Norris, to file in the Republican Primary for United States Senator. Of course, the charge is wickedly false. I know this fine young man. He married a Holt county girl, and all of us who know him and all of his wife's relatives respect him and admire him. He is now a candidate for election as Railway Commissioner on the Republican ticket and richly deserves to be elected. But you and the World-Herald are fighting him. You want the Republicans to cut their ticket and vote for you. But you are such a hide-bound Democrat that you will not vote for such a fine, progressive young man as Hugh Drake.

Now, the fact is that is was Mr. Stebbins, the Republican candidate against Senator Norris, and other corrupt politicians who got this grocery clerk to file. The fine Republican men and women who voted for Stebbins knew nothing of the corruption that was going on. Stebbins denied everything, until Senator Nye got him on the witness stand in Omaha. Then he admitted that he had given a bribe of a \$500.00 United States bond to this grocery clerk, George W. Norris, to file on the ticket as a Republican candidate for United States Senator. He refused to tell of any money contributed by any other crooks in this dastardly plot. If it had succeeded there would have been two men on the ballot named George W. Norris. The Republican voters in their primaries would not have known whether they were voting for their great United States Senator George W. Norris or another George W. Norris, who was a grocery clerk in Custer County.

Republicans who voted for Stebbins are telling me every day of their disgust at having voted for him instead of voting for Senator Norris. If they had known what Stebbins and his crowd had done, then Stebbins would not have gotten more than a mere sprinkling of votes in Nebraska. Have you got the courage and sincerity to denounce Stebbins and his crew from a public platform? I do not believe it, Senator. You are getting the support of Stebbins and every other political crook who tried to cheat the Republican voters of Nebraska from the right to decide for themselves the candidate they wanted for Senator. If the Stebbins bribe had succeeded, it would have been impossible for the voters to know who is recognized as one of the ablest of our United States Senators in this whether they were voting for a man country or for a grocery clerk.

Of course, every corrupt politician

who was into this bribery plot is supporting you for United States Senator. Have you got the courage to denounce these bribe-givers, and the courage to denounce the bribe-taker the grocery clerk in Custer County?

There are corrupt men and organizations in both of the political parties, of course, but that does not justify good citizens in supporting them or affiliating with them. These corrupt politicians really care nothing about the party name. They are out for the graft.

Tammany Hall is Democratic—AND CORRUPT. Big Bill Thompson's machine in Chicago is Republican—AND CORRUPT. The gang that tried to put the grocery clerk on the ticket, and used bribery to do it, was a Republican—AND CORRUPT. "Birds of a feather flock together." But, Senator, I would not class you

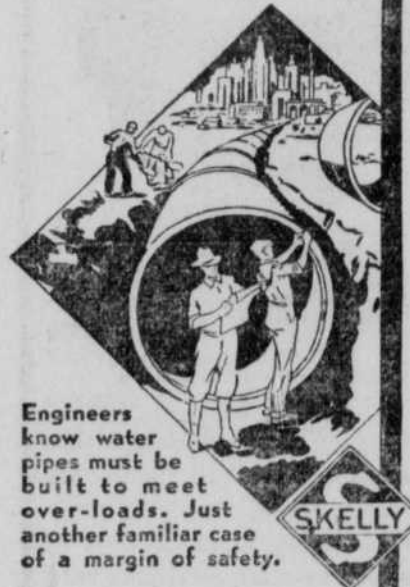
