The county treasurer has received the allotment of car, truck and motor cycle license plates for 1931. They are silver gray with maroon numbers; the numbers are the same size as the present plates. The Interstate Power Company held a Grand Opening of the new electric power plant at Wausa, Wednesday evening at 5:00 o'clock. A buffet luncheon consisting of baked ham sandwiches and pickles was served followed by cigars and candy. Representatives of the company were present and in charge of the entertainment. Leonard Horst, formerly of Elgin, but now residing at Martin, South Dakota, was fined \$320 for shooting too many ducks and transporting them illegally. He was fined \$10 each for the excess amount of ducks over fifteen; his license was cancelled, his gun and game were confiscated and he was required to pay the cost of prosecution. The state corn husking contest was held at Alma, Nebraska, Wednesday and was won by Guy Simms of Republican City; his record was 27.36 bushels of corn in one hour and twenty minutes. He will represent the state in the national contest which will be held at Norton, Kansas, tomorrow. Martin Christenson was second with 26.05 bushels of corn. 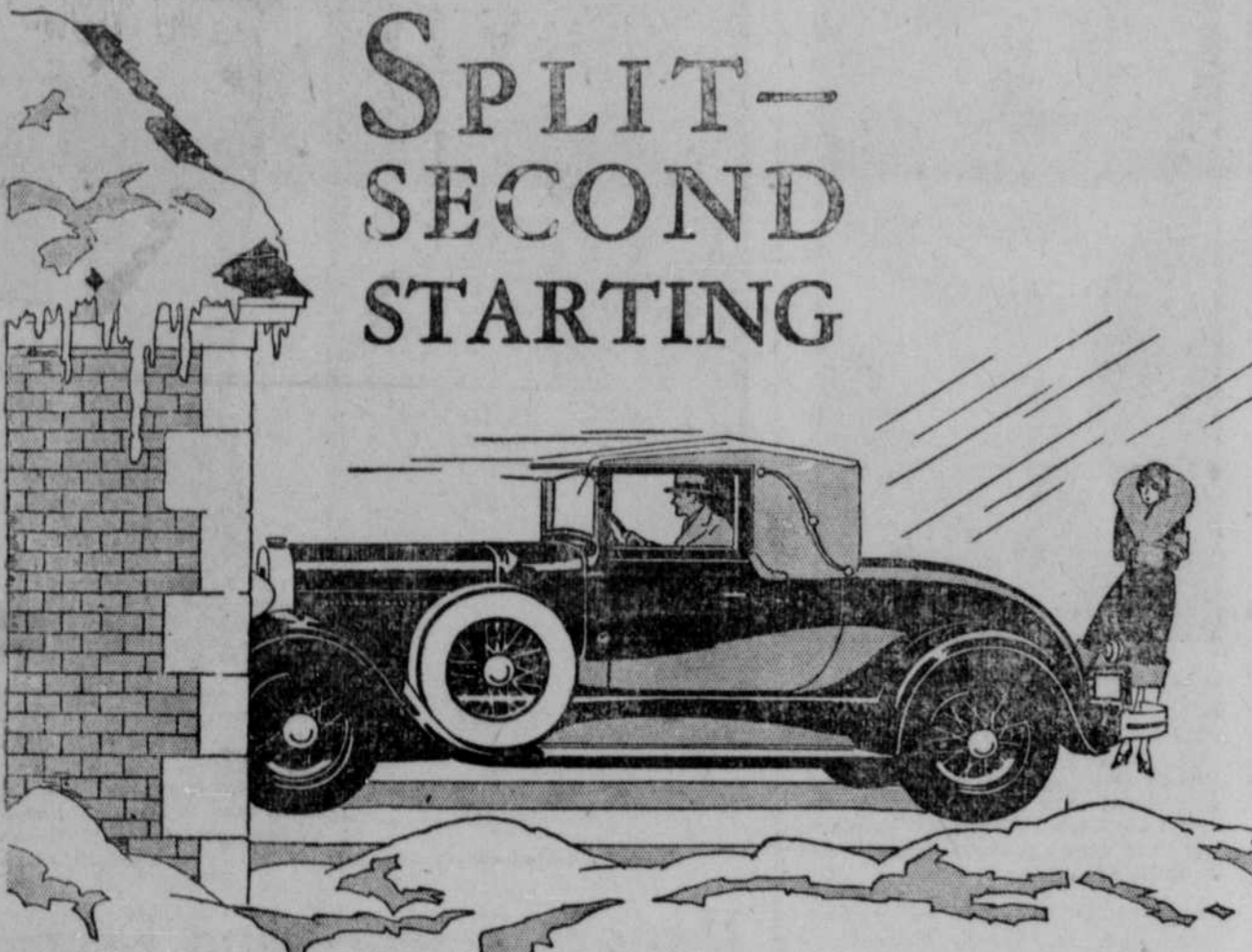
