Lewis Ward, aged about sixty years, died at his home just east of the city limits last Thursday afternoon, from cancer of the jaw. Mr. Ward has been a patient sufferer with the disease for several months past.  
 Mr. Ward was born in Maryland about sixty years ago; no authenticity of his birth has been found since his death. He came to Holt county from Sarpy county, Nebraska, eighteen years ago and engaged in farming, which pursuit he has continued to follow.  
 He was united in marriage in Omaha on May 20, 1920, to Miss Jennie Kelly of this vicinity, who survives him.  
 Funeral services were held Saturday morning at 10:30 from the funeral parlors of the Biglin mortuary. Burial was in Prospect Hill cemetery.

### GUSTAVE REIDER

G. F. Reider passed away at his home in Gregory, South Dakota, on Monday, November 3rd, following months of suffering with cancer of the lungs.  
 Mr. Reider has been mayor of the city of Gregory for the past fourteen years; he has devoted his entire time to the administration of the affairs of the city; during his long residence in Gregory he has endeared himself in the hearts of a host of friends who are deeply grieved over his death. He was the first white settler in Gregory county and the last of the Civil War veterans in that vicinity.  
 Gustave Reider was born in Baden, Germany, June 3, 1846; following the Civil War he enlisted in the regular army and served in Texas, Kansas and New Mexico where the army was kept to hold the Indians in control. Later he was transferred to Ft. Randall, where he was mustered out of the service.  
 He was married to Susan Carroll six daughters were born. Mrs. Reider in 1878; to this union three sons and one daughter were born. One of the boys, Gustave, was born in 1881, he was married to Mrs. Mary O'Sullivan of O'Neill, Nebraska, who survives him, as does one son and five daughters.  
 The surviving children are: Mrs. Nellie Moran, Lake Andes; Mrs. M. I. He Kirwan, Ft. Pierre; Mrs. Carroll Decker, Lucas; Mrs. Lizzie Henry, Kimball, Neb.; Mrs. Lucille Blimmer, Dallas; and Miss Susie Reider, Los Angeles, Calif., all of whom excepting Mrs. Henry, with their families, were present at the funeral.  
 The funeral services were held from St. Joseph's church in Gregory on Thursday, November 6th.

### FRED E. TICKNOR

Funeral services for Fred E. Ticknor were held at the M. E. church, Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Elder Melvin Russell of the L. D. S. church, assisted by Rev. Mertie E.

The children are: Mrs. Orville Kastor, Cochrane, Alberta, Canada; Elmer, of Burke, S. D.; Vaughn of Anoka, Neb., and Harold, of Inman. There were also seventeen grand-children. Many beautiful floral tributes were in evidence.
