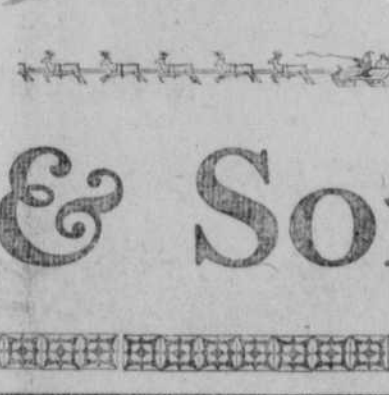

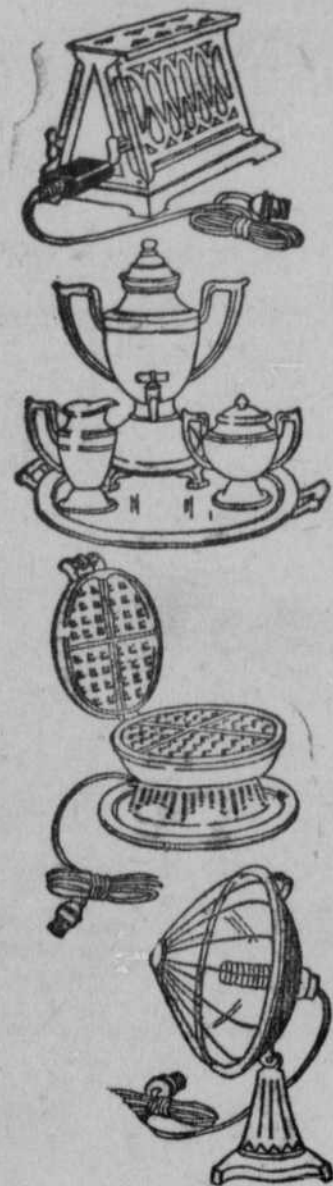

#### GLADYS SIMMONS WRITES OF OPENING OF CONGRESS

School has begun again. At least so it seemed again last Monday to those looking down from the gallery upon the reassembling House members. To all appearances, they were college students, slapping each other on the back, shaking hands or standing with

arms over each others shoulders. Of course, they were students rather scant as to hair supply, and rather large as to waist measure, but those are unimportant details. It's the spirit that counts.

The lady members, too, were holding informal receptions, as cordially greeted as their brothers. A new one was welcomed, sitting bravely in her black dress. She had been elected to succeed her husband, the handsome southern gentleman, Otis Wingo, of Arkansas. His dying wish was there, by fulfilled. She had shown great devotion to him. Since his recovery from a serious illness several years ago, he was never on the floor of the House without his wife or daughter in the gallery, watching him for signs of illness. Mrs. Wingo's election brought about a forward step in feminine politics—two ladies are members from one state. But in the next Congress, the nine ladies will be reduced to six, three Republicans and three Democrats. One was defeated, one was not a candidate for re-election, one was a candidate for election to the Senate. Of the six who will "carry on," three succeeded their husbands and five are widows.

The procedure was as usual on the opening day. The Speaker pounded the gavel at twelve; the joyous members stood quietly by their seats, and the fine looking, deep-voiced chaplain gave his inspiring prayer. Then, roll call, whereupon the bedlam of visiting began again, until one wondered how they ever heard their names called, and how the clerk's voice ever stood talking against such competition.

Next, the swearing in of the thirteen new members; three to succeed those who had resigned, ten; those who had died in the past few months. Too many deaths for such a short time. In the twenty-one months of this Congress' existence, there have been twenty-three deaths, which does not speak very well for the conditions of health of such an office.

In the galleries was another reunion, less boisterous but just as pleasant. The wives of the men below were just as glad to see each other as were their husbands. But both above and below was the feeling of sadness that this was the last reunion for many. Everywhere was there discussion of the defeats of friends in

the summer's elections, primary and general, and not only from the personal standpoint but from that of the country as a whole; the defeat of men of long years of service who have attained positions of power and great value to the country, their places taken by men who, though perhaps just as able, cannot reach that power and value until they have served equally long.

Then, a little business. A committee appointed to notify the President that the House was ready to receive his message. Resolutions of sorrow for the death of members. Adjournment out of respect to their memory. The end of the first day of the short session, which promises to be both busy and full of interest.
