The O'Neill Public School will open the basketball season December 19th. Their first game will be with Bassett on their own floor.

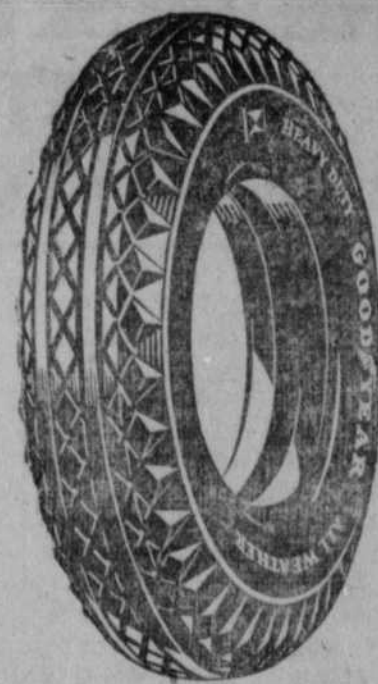
Glen E. Mott and Violet Allshouse, both of Stuart, were married Saturday, December 6th by L. L. Cosner, justice of the peace.

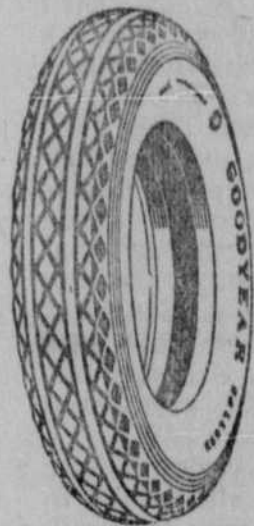

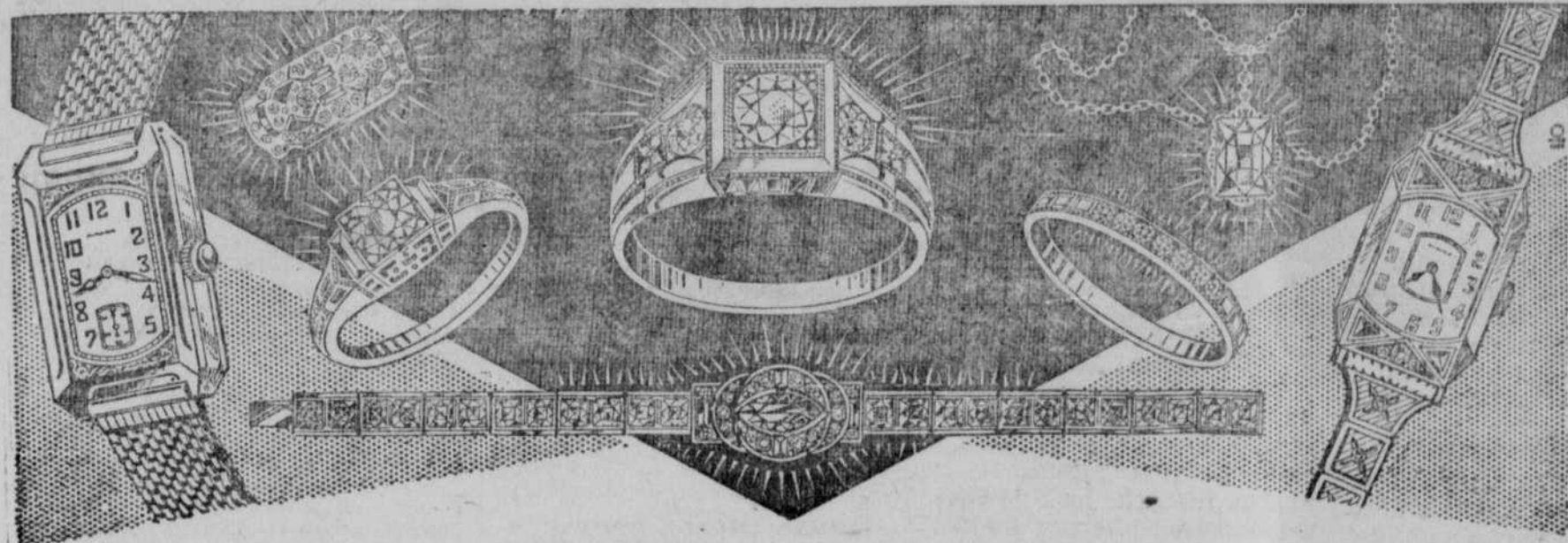
