### HOLT COUNTY RED CROSS EXCEEDS QUOTA

The Holt County Red Cross Organization exceeded their quota of \$200 for the drouth relief in the ten million dollar program being spon-

sored by the government. The quota of \$200 for Holt County was perhaps almost doubled; this vicinity subscribed \$160 and we understand that the other towns in the county contributed toward the fund. The county has an active Red Cross organization that is functioning all the time. It does many things that do not receive public notice. When the people of the county wish to contribute to the relief of the sufferers they should do so through the Holt County chapter and thus let the county have the credit for the county contribution, otherwise your money might fall into the wrong hands and do no one good.

The O'Neill chapter has also been functioning; they have expended \$50 for clothing recently through the local Woman's Club; they often assist the soldiers boys who are in need; the local chapter is now sponsoring the school nurse program which is proving to be a worth-while venture. The school nurse has been employed for several weeks each winter and spring.

### COYOTE HUNT AT MEEK SCHEDULED FOR SUNDAY

A big round-up of coyotes is planned for next Sunday in the territory north of Meek, beginning at one o'clock.

The Midway garage will be the starting point. The lines will run three miles east and to the Eagle Creek north from the Midway garage; the north line will be the Eagle Creek; the east line will be north to the Eagle from the corner 3 miles east of the Midway garage.

A large crowd is expected to participate in this hunt; Spencer and Redbird will be there.

Nothing but shot guns will be permitted.

Those in charge of the hunt are asking those who take part in the round-up to scatter out and cover all of the ground as the coyote is a wise fellow and will permit one to overlook him if possible.

The proceeds received from the sale of the coyotes captured will be used to purchase furs for some needy children in the Meek neighborhood.

### TRUCK LOAD OF HORSES WRECKED ON HIGHWAY

A Chevrolet truck loaded with four head of horses went to the ditch about one and one-half miles north of O'Neill on Highways Nos. 20 and 13 late last Sunday afternoon. Two of the horses suffered broken necks and the other two seemed to emerge from the wreck in fairly good shape. The cab was torn from the truck; the driver, Chris Hansen, and companion were not seriously injured although they were somewhat scratched and bruised.

We understand that the driver claimed that the horses all went to the right side of the truck at the same time, causing the right front wheel of the truck to collapse, with the above result.

Harry Page, residing three miles north of the Fair grounds, sowed ten acres of ground to rye and sweet clover last week; he also sowed ten acres of sweet clover in a pasture after the ground had been disced. We understand that there is no frost in the open ground but that there is moisture all the way down. It is very unusual to see farmers plowing and sowing grain in February but such is the case this year. Several parties who have been driving over the highways recently say that a number of farmers in the counties east of us are plowing and getting the ground ready for spring planting.

R. H. Parker arrived home today (Thursday) from a four month auto trip in the east. He left O'Neill on October 1st, going to Chicago; from there he drove to points of interest, visiting Niagara Falls, various places in New York state, Washington, D. C., Virginia and West Virginia. He was through the drouth area in Virginia, southern Indiana and southern Illinois. He says that the worst part of the drouth in the stricken areas of Indiana and Illinois is the fact that the wells are going dry; people had to sell their stock or drive it to the rivers; water is selling for about 50c per barrel in certain localities. New York state had a very short crop, due to drouth conditions; the rivers are very low and the wells there are drying up. The factories are giving each of their men about two hours work per day which gives them enough money to keep them from starving. Mr. Parker says that after looking the United States over pretty closely he thinks that O'Neill and Holt County are pretty good places in which to live.
