



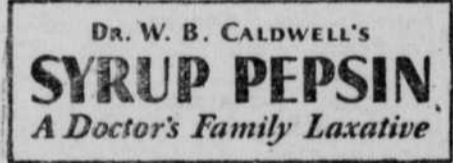

London—A bit of evidence given in High Court here recently is thought to have cost a record amount. It came during the \$5,000,000 Bank of Portugal claim case, and was presented by a Portuguese bank official. He traveled from Portugal with other witnesses and, after waiting for a month for the trial to come up, took the stand and spoke 149 words in answer to questions asked him. It has been figured out that those words, all of which had to be interrupted, ran about 37 to the minute. At that rate, and considering the expense of keeping the witness in a hotel, his traveling expenses and incidentals, his part in the case cost more than \$50 a minute.

What were the draft ages in the Civil War? I. W. P.

A. The soldiers drafted into the Union Army were between the ages of 18 and 45 years. The first draft law of the Confederate states, 1862, gave the age limits as 18-25—this was later increased to 45. The act of 1864 drafted into military service all white men between 17 and 50; those between 17 and 18, and 45 and 50 to constitute a reserve.

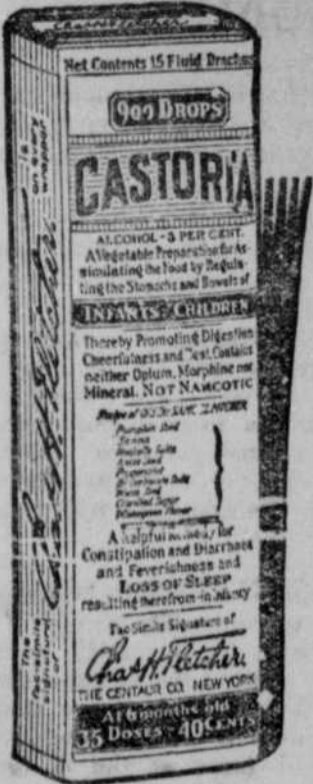

How to Escape FLU

- 1 Avoid so far as possible the places where flu germs are most likely to be spread; overcrowded cars and public meeting places; overheated, stuffy rooms.
2 Be careful of close contact with others and beware of all coughers and sneezers; breathe through the nose, get fresh air, but avoid drafts or chilling.
3 Get lots of rest. Eat plenty of citrus fruits.
4 Keep the bowels open. Take extra precaution to keep in good physical condition, so your system will have high resistance against germs.

Blight-Resistant Beans Sought to Cut Crop Loss

Washington — Apparently the best control for bacterial blight which, second to anthracnose, is the worst bean disease, is the development of blight-resistant varieties, says Dr. W. J. Zaunmeyer, assistant government pathologist. The annual loss from the disease approximates \$250,000 bushels. Losses in bad seasons have run as high as 75 per cent of the crop. In isolated instances and in particularly bad years complete destruction of a field is not uncommon.

UNEMPLOYMENT AID Bogota, Colombia—Thousands of men have been put to work in this city in an effort to relieve the unemployment situation. The job given each one is the same, and shows foresight on the part of city officials. Each will be given a part in the city's cleanup campaign, carried out in preparation for the centennial of Simon Bolivar, national hero of South American nations.
