Mr. and Mrs. Joe Winkler and children visited at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Lorenze, Monday even-


Pauline Dusatko and Alda a Teresa Pongratz, students from St. Mary's Academy, spent Easter vaca-tion with home folks.


