

Q. How was Alaska's flag se-lected? E. J. P. A. The contest was held by the

American Legion, Department of Alaska, in the public, private, and native schools in the territory for the purpose of selecting an official flag for Alaska. A law passed by the legislature of the department of Alaska on May 2, 1927, provided that the design of the official flag (the winning design) is eight and that the design of the official flag (the winning design) is eight gold stars in a field of blue, so selected for its simplicity, its originality, and its symbolism. The blue, one of our national colors, typifies the eve-ning sky, the blue of the sea and of mountain lakes and of wild flowers that grow in Alaskan soil, the gold being significant of the wealth tha lies hidden in Alaska's bills and streams: and the law hills and streams; and the law also provides that the governor shall cause the original design to be encased properly and placed in the Alaska Historical museum and that due credit be given to Benny Benson, age 13 years, a student in the seventh grade of the Mission Territorial school, near Stward, Alaska, the designer of the flag, herein described and adopted, as the official flag of Alaska.

Q. Why has America its present system of weights and measures? H. H.

A. In the early colonial days of America, the weights and measures used by the colonists weer naturally those of the mother country, and in most cases copies of the home standards were brought over and entrusted to the care of special officers of the Commonwealth. In the English colonies it was usually the yard of 1588 that was employed. At the time of the Revolution, the new country naturally continued with its existing British standards, and although the constitution gave Congress the power to fix the standard of weights and measures, nothing was immediately done. Thomas Jefferson in 1790 suggested in Congress the establishment of a decimal system. The question was again taken up in Congress in 1817 and 1830. On July 28, 1866, the metric system of weights and measures was legalized by act of Congress. In 1875 the United States joined with a number of others in the establishment of the International Burea of Weights and Measures in Paris.





A similar su-perstition exists among the fisher-men of Yorkshire. If they meet a woman when leaving home they immediately return home.

A. A. A. The royal standard of Italy consists of a square blue field on which is centered the national coat-of-arms. When Napoleon made the northern provinces of Italy into a kingdom in 1805, he gave it a flag of three colors—green next to the flagstaff, white in the middle and red at the fly end. This flag disap-peared when Napoleon was overthrown but was revived when Vic-tor Emmanuel, king of Sardinia, and a member of the House of Sa-voy, became king. At the present day Italy's flag consists of the Savoy arms, surmounted by a crown, on the central white vertical stripe
