Chief Hough notified Sheriff Duffy of the situation, however, and Sheriff Duffy, deputizing Sheridan Simmons of O'Neill to assist him, drove out to the junction and waited there

Soon the cars came along and Sheriff Duffy says that he tried to halt them but could not do so. He and Simmons then followed Deputies Bertram and Kassenbaum into O'Neill.

Sheriff Duffy says that the cars traveled 55 miles an hour between the junction and O'Neill, which further led him to believe that the men were fugitives.

The Fremont officers, however, de-cided to stop at O'Neill for the even-ing meal. Both cars pulled into the curb and Sheriff Duffy and Simmons also parked their car and got out. Kassenbaum suddenly decided to

drive a short distance farther down the street and park in front of a res-taurant. As he started to back out of the parking stall Simmons, the man with Sheriff Duffy, fired a shot which punctured a fender on Kassen-baum's car and tore a hole in the tire of a rear wheel.


