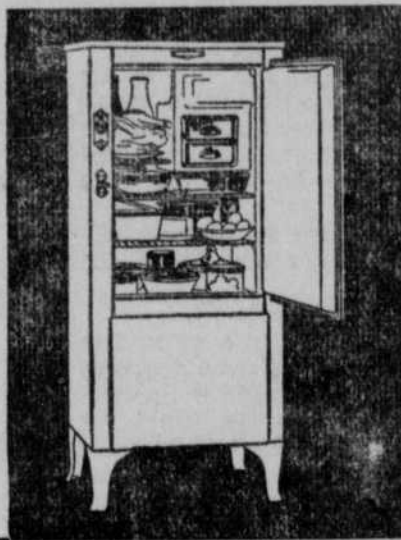

THE PET DOG POISONER SHOULD READ THIS STORY

A number of pet dogs have been poisoned in O'Neill during the past few months. Not long ago the pet pooch belonging to Wink Waid was given a dose of poison but quick action saved its life. Just why some persons will deliberately poison a harmless pet dog is beyond the conception of liberty loving people. Someone poisoned the pet dog belonging to Bess Streeter Aldrich, the author, at her home town, Elmwood, Nebraska; she wrote an appropriate editorial on the subject. The Omaha Bee-News of May 5, 1931, copied the article, with comment. Here it is: "Bess Streeter Aldrich's pet dog, Jack, which 'was old and slobbered and had fleas,' was one of a dozen victims of a dog poisoner in the author's home town of Elmwood, Neb.

Mrs. Aldrich wrote a stinging editorial for the Elmwood Leader-Echo in its issue of April 16, and no dogs have been poisoned since that time. "Our dog is dead," she wrote. "He was old and he slobbered and he had fleas. But we loved him. And it was not this night-rider's business to say his time had come. Neither is it pleasant to contemplate the thought of a deadly strychnine planted promiscuously about town with small children in many of the houses.

"But the deed is done and no apparent proof of the perpetrator's identity is at hand. He will read this item, too, and laugh at it, for it will be his idea of a good joke. This item was not written anonymously in the dead of night. It was written in the clear daylight and signed,
