THE CITY COUNCIL DEFERS THE PURCHASE OF NEW FIRE TRUCK

The city council did not purchase a new fire truck last Tuesday evening but has deferred the matter to a later date. The reason for the postponement was the fact that the state department had refused to register the bonds. City Attorney W. J. Hammond drove to Lincoln, Sunday and on Monday morning made an investigation. Attorney General Sorensen had ruled that as the bonds were issued to run but seven years they did not conform to the statute; Sorensen contends that the bonds must run for twenty years; they may be optional and subject to payment after five years. City Attorney Hammond drew up the bonds under a statute that did not specify any number of years and contends that the bonds are legal while Attorney General Sorensen claims that the statute under which the bonds were drawn was superseded by a later section which states that the bonds must run for twenty years.

Attorney Hammond issued a writ of mandamus to force the state auditor to register the bonds. The case was argued Wednesday; the Judge has the case under advisement. The chances are that the case will go to the supreme court before the question is finally decided. In the meantime the city will continue to get along with the present fire truck.

During the past two months 11,570 crow eggs have been delivered to the county clerk who has paid out \$578.50 in bounty for them. During that time 186 coyote scalps were presented for bounty which netted the owners \$372.00.

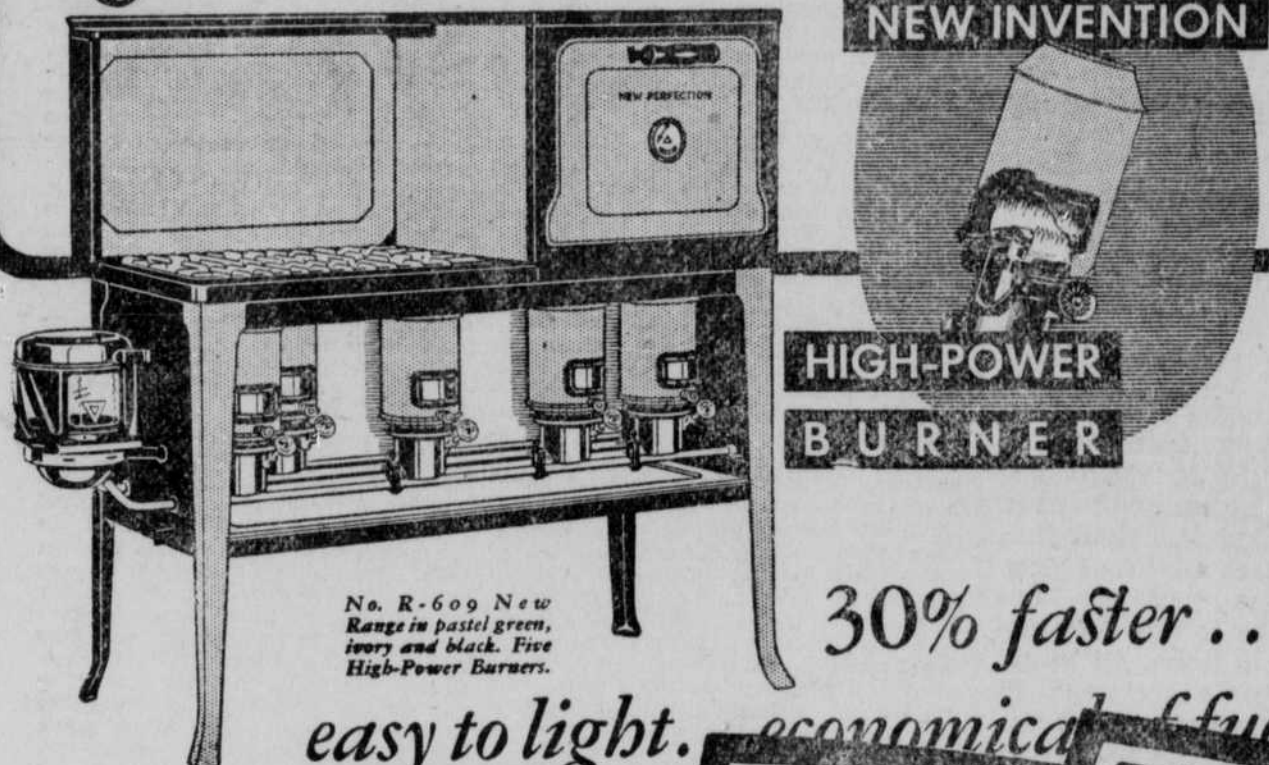
