### Aw, Gee! Ain't Cops Ever Been Kids?



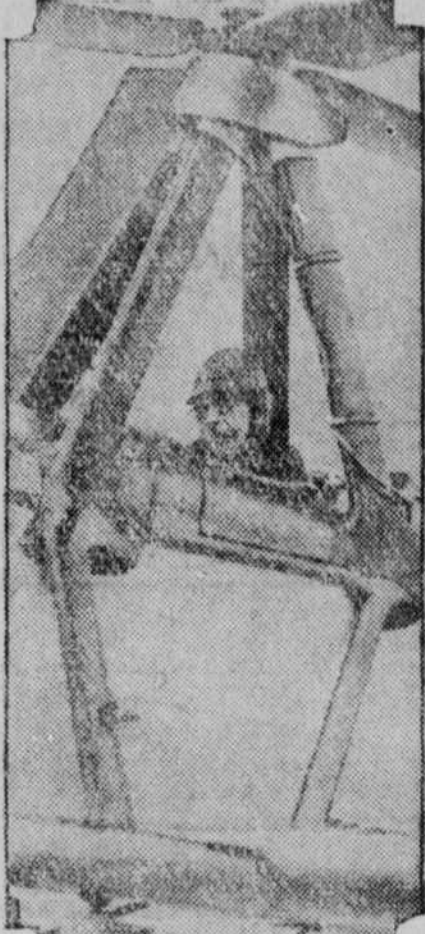

### Crossed Atlantic in This



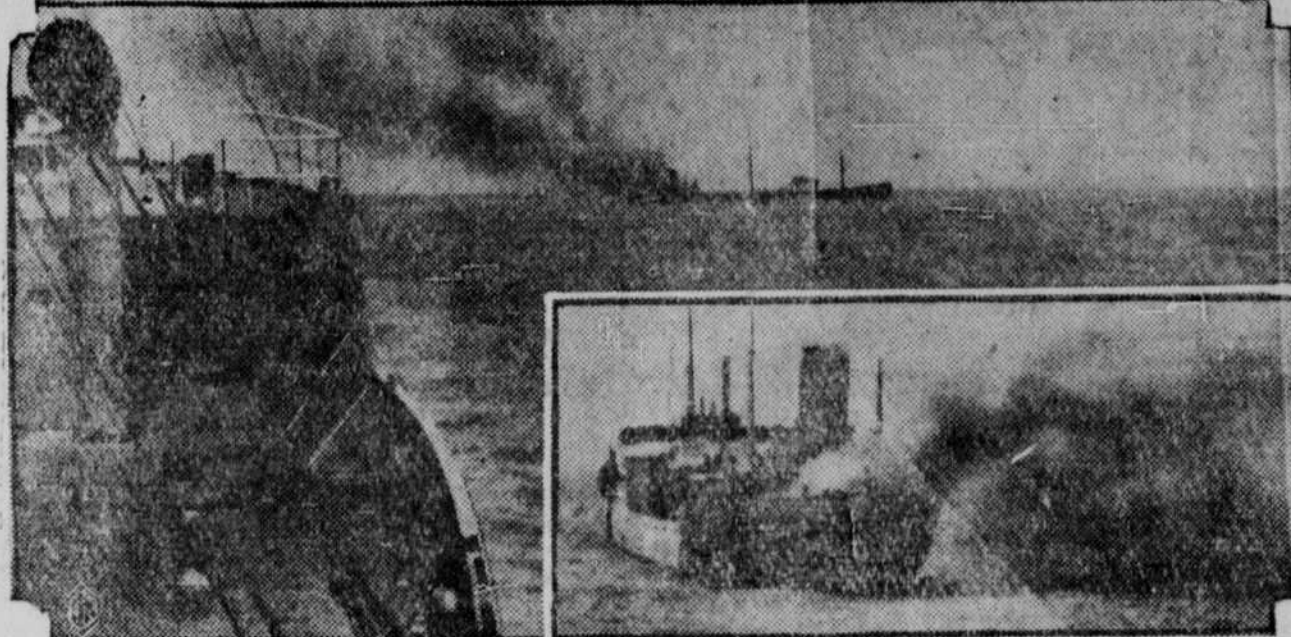

### Sharpshooter Shows How



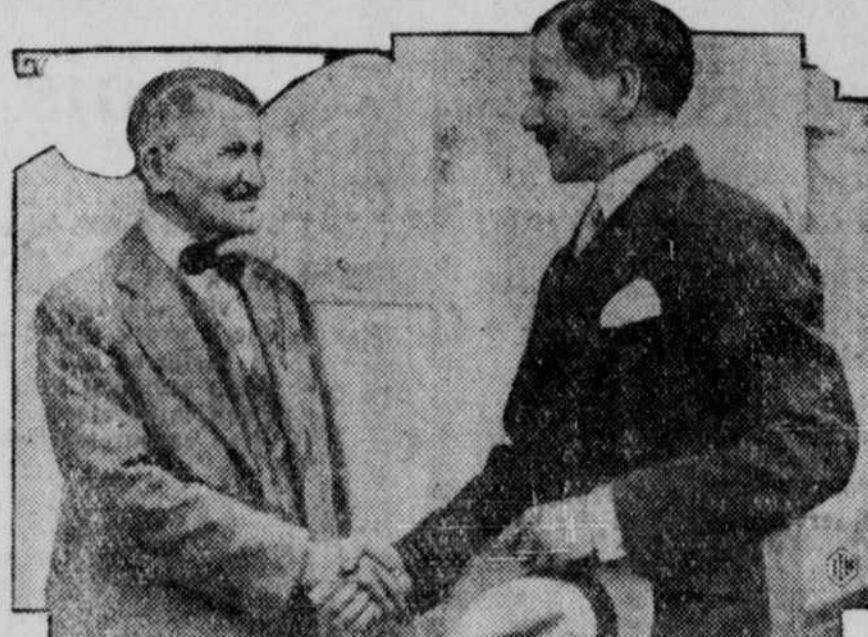
