While still a small lad, his parents moved to Amboy, Indiana; later to Fairmont, Indiana, where he resided for twelve years. At the age of seventeen years he moved with his parents to Rippey, Green county, Iowa, where he made his home until the spring of 1884 when he came to Agee, Nebraska; he came to Holt county in the fall of 1883 and filed upon the homestead which he possessed at the time of his death.

He was united in marriage to Sarah J. Naylor, in Dallas county, Iowa, near the town of Perry, in 1883; to this union four children were born, Ross, or Dorsey, Nebraska; Glenn, of Agee, Nebraska; Alma Arabelle, who passed away May 30, 1930, and Ethel Mae, who passed away in 1918. He leaves to mourn his death, besides his wife and sons, three sisters and one brother, Mrs. Rhoda Herron and Mrs. Sarah Brown, of Rifle, Colorado; Mrs. R. R. Harris, Omaha, Nebraska; Elias Ridgeway, Riverside, California; one brother, Isaac, of Portland, Oregon, and one sister, Mrs. E. E. Cole, of Star, Nebraska, preceded him in death.

Mr. Ridgeway was one of the pioneers of this county and went through all of the hardship that the early settlers were compelled to endure, that his posterity might have a home; he was a hard working man; he enjoyed very good health until the last three years, which has been filled with much suffering.
