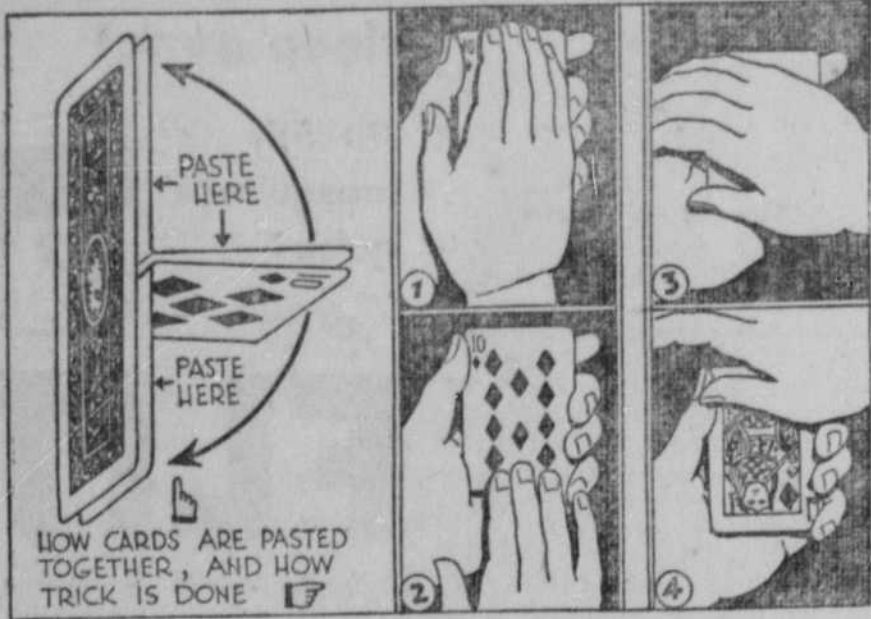


TRICKS of MAGIC EXPLAINED by Will L. Lindhorst

HOW TO CHANGE ONE CARD INTO ANOTHER



HOW CARDS ARE PASTED TOGETHER, AND HOW TRICK IS DONE

Three cards are used in preparing for this trick. Two of the cards are folded in half, and one-half of each is pasted on the face of the third card, which remains straight. The cards are pasted so the creases meet in the center of the third card, and this leaves the other two halves standing upright with backs to each other. These are then pasted together, and you will find that by blending them in either direction you will be able to change one card into the other. When you are ready to present the trick, hold the cards in your left hand with the upright part flat, so that it appears to be one card. Then pass your right hand over it, in the manner shown in the above drawing, and release the fingers of your left hand which holds the cards flat. As the hand passes over the cards it draws the bent part down or up, according to which way it is moved, and at the same time covers the movement of the card, so that when the hand is withdrawn the card will have changed into another. It is necessary to stand away from your audience so that the creases in the cards do not show.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the County Clerk of Holt County, Nebraska, in the Town of O'Neill, up to the hour of 12 o'clock Noon of the 28th day of July, 1931, for the construction and erection of the superstructure of all bridges, and for furnishing the materials in connection with same, to be built in Holt County for the period of one year, at a specified sum per lineal foot for the superstructure of all such bridges, and at a specified sum per lineal foot for the superstructure of all approaches, and at a specified sum per lineal foot for all piling used in the substructure of all bridges and approaches and at a specified sum per cubic foot (board measure) for all caps, sway braces and other wood materials used in the substructure of such bridges and approaches, and for the repair of the superstructure, the substructure and approaches of all bridges to be repaired in said County for said period of one year.

In the event the substructure of such bridges or approaches is built wholly or in part of stone, brick, cement or concrete, the contract for the portion of said substructure to be built of said material shall be let at a specified sum per cubic foot in place.

In general character the work consists of any kind covered by the Nebraska Standard Bridge Plans, copies of which are on file in the office of the County Clerk.

The number and kind of bridges required to be built in the county and their proposed location as near as can be estimated and determined is as follows:

One 20-ft. wood pile bridge, 16-ft. roadway between Sections 35 and 36, Township 31, Range 13, and any other bridges at any other location in the county that the county board may see fit to order built during the life of contract.

All bidders are required to bid on the plans and specifications and bidding blanks prepared by the Secretary of the State Board of Irrigation and all bids shall be made strictly in accordance with all bridge laws of the State of Nebraska, pertaining to such matters.
