WHEREAS there has been appropriated by the 1937 Nebraska Legislature by L. B. Nos. 70 and 158 an amount equal to that appropriated by the Federal Government for the express purpose of matching the said funds appropriated by the Federal Government for construction and improvement of secondary or feeder roads, and

WHEREAS, there exists in Holt county, feeder roads de-scribed as follows:

1. Beginning at Page and running south to connect with the new project upon which bids were recently let, running from junction of Highways Eight and Twenty to near Stafford to connect with the new Highway Number Eight.

2. Beginning at the Village of Chambers and running west to connect with State Highway Number Fleven.
