The high school students are receiving useful and practical instructions on the regulations and rules of our own library. The catalogue system used in the O. H. S. library is the "Standard Dewey System," and is the system employed in most of the large libraries in the United States. The students are preparing to become future library assistants.

Metal work is the general subject of study in the shop for the fourth six weeks period. It covers all practical applications such as the make up of tools, colors also the different hardness of iron, edged tools, grinders, different metal, and solder and its use. This is one of the most practical courses taught in the high school curriculum.

Public Speaking: This is an interesting side line subject taught in the high school curriculum recently offered by Miss Duffy. She states that it can be easily seen that a knowledge of public speaking is finest pictures . . most valuable to the average individual and she also states that she does not allow her students to memorize a speech to be given in Fri.-Sat. her classes.


