One Pound of Butter Equals Twenty-five Pounds of Oleo

Don't believe everything you see or read in the newspapers or magazines about the value of oleo-margarine. Butter substitute boosters, including cotton-seed oil members tried to jam a law thru the House which would have forced table use of oleomargarine in veterans hospitals. They met with an angry army of farm members who defeated the plan.

A very distinguished doctor and surgeon member of the House of Representatives told the exponents

of oleo that they were wrong when they claimed oleo is as good as butter. That claim has been made on the floor many times. It is made in many publications which carry pitiful pictures of undernourished children "begging for a spread of oleo." They are now answered by Congressman Sirovich. The doctor said that: "From a medical standpoint," Vitamin A is missing in oleo. Therefore it is necessary to have Vitamin A as contained in butterfat in a food product, instead of oleomargarine. It takes 25 pounds of oleo to give as much nutritive value as is contained in one pound of wholesome butter made from cow's milk.

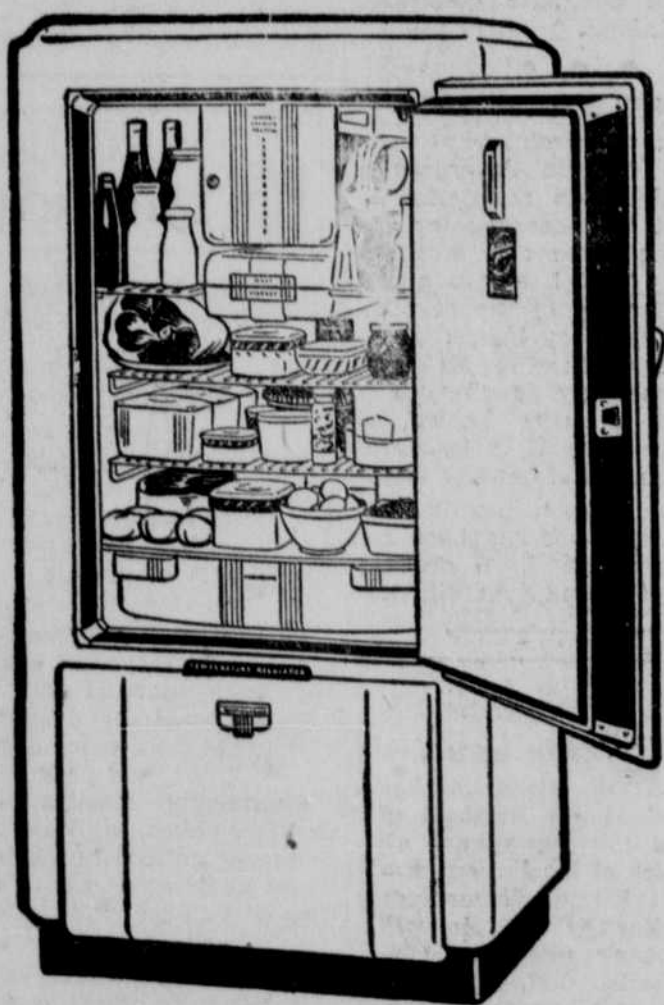
