## CONGRESS

AS SEEN BY KARL STEFAN

Binderup Hits Snag

Charley Binderup, Nebraska congressman from Minden has given much study to the monetary reform problem and has furnished members with voluminous information in which his monetary reform bill is explained in a very understandable manner. But the Nebraskan ran afoul of the powers of committee chiefs and he finds Banking and Currency won't give him a hearing. But that isn't stopping this Nebraskan who has now secured his own committee room on the Senate side and is getting together a score of congressmen, and now he will hold his own hearings to convince members this his bill should become law.

## Everybody For TVA Investigation

There wasn't even a roll call when the bill to investigate the gigantic TVA set-up came up in the House. Nearly everybody was for it. The fight between the three directors, one of them recently dismissed by the President, caused a lot of excitement in the House but the hints of mismanagement and inefficiency were so numerous that the House felt that the matter ought to be looked into.

A plan by some of the members to leave out the investigation of the private power companies in the TVA vicinity failed. Most members want both sides fully investigated. There was all kinds of talk about "dirty linen" and "skeletons in secret closets," and the sense of the House was that in this atmosphere of recrimination, the linen and skeletons of both the TVA and the power companies should be scrutinized.

## Farmers and Educators Feared Reorganization Measure

To the desk of every congressman came letters from the National Grange, National Milk Producers, National cooperatives and the American Federation of Labor protesting against passage of the reorganization bill. These great organizations protested on the ground that labor and farmers had had no opportunity to be heard on the legislation. Much is said in these letters about how the new bill would effect farmers and labor. These letters also protested against abolition of the present set-up of the Civil Service. The farm organizations fear that the new program may seriously effect the present functions of the Department of Agriculture. Fears are also expressed over what may or may not happen to the office of education.

Three years ago France put a New Deal into effect and it doesn't seem to be going so well over there either.

Helping the railroads seems to be developing into as big a political issue as helping the farmers.
