ing the legislative session, Speaker Warner, as presiding officer, signed vouchers in the absence of the lieutenant governor. Warner is now a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. There are two legal theories expounded by the sea of lawyers who infest state house corridors. One is that the office is vacant and that the governor must appoint. Others maintain that Warner is now legal lieutenant governor and that he is ineligible to seek the governorship.

Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff, and Ellis Bowker of Kearney, have plunged into the task of remodeling their old age pension proposals. Attorney General Hunter insisted that Carpenter's law was unconstitutional because Terry had an old age pension sales tax and a gasoline tax reduction clause in the same initiative measure. The federal authorities declined to contribute any portion of federal funds to any plan not administered solely on a basis of need. The Carpenter plan provided \$30 a month old age pension at the age of 65.

The oldest employee of the University of Nebraska in regard to service, John M. Chowins, mechanic in the physics department, will retire at the end of this year, his retirement having been approved at a meeting of the board of regents last week. He has served the university for 51 years, having become connected with the physics department in 1887. Chowins' latest accomplishment was to design and superintend the mounting of the mirror and tube and to build the fittings for the new reflector tele-

scope which is now mounted in the observatory on the agricultural campus.

A dream of 50 years ago was revived when Sarpy and Cass county farmers filed petitions with State Engineer Tilley to create the Ak-Sar-Ben Public Power and Irrigation district. The petitioners seek a two million dollar allotment to build a dam across the Platte river near South Bend, Nebr. It is not proposed to develop any power. Irrigation, recreation, flood control and the storage of water for Missouri river navigation are features of the bill.

Pending decision on a PWA application for \$67,000, the state normal board has postponed opening 31 bids on the construction of the proposed \$150,000 men's dormitory at the Kearney state teachers' college. Application has also been made for a 45 per cent PWA grant in connection with the proposed dormitory at the Peru state teachers' college, where John Latenser, jr., of Omaha, has been employed as full time architect. He is a former Nebraska PWA director.

A dozen highway department maintenance sheds are to be built in eastern Nebraska for district 2, says Fred H. Klietsch, state highway maintenance engineer, who stated that a WPA allotment of \$20,380 has been authorized by the federal government for that purpose. Sheds are under construction at Ord, Kearney and St. Paul, and another is to be built at David City. Other sites are to be selected.

On Arbor day, somewhere in western Nebraska, the ten millionth tree was planted by United States forestry service shelterbelt project workers—the ten millionth since the shelterbelt was started in 1935. Trees are now being planted in the shelterbelt at a rate of 250,000 a day, according to E. L. Perry, chief of information for the project.
