Secretary Doyle refused to resign at the request of two members of the commission. I. V. Packard was chosen secretary to succeed him, and the statements made by the principals in the row indicated that the commission had practically ceased to function soon after the legislature adjourned, as the result of a quarrel over gas-tax exemption.

There are numerous bureaus and commissions at the state house. It is claimed that many exist that have no real duties, while others are impotent because of interecine strife.

The 1935 law, which requires that if persons who hold public office wish to file for some other office they must do so fifty days before the primary, instead of the customary forty days, is constitutional according to a recent opinion by Barlowe Nye, administrative attorney in the office of the attorney general, in answer to an inquiry from A. F. Alder, county attorney at Taylor. The law applies in Nye's opinion to all offices created by statute, but hardly he thinks, to offices created by the constitution, or to school district or city offices.

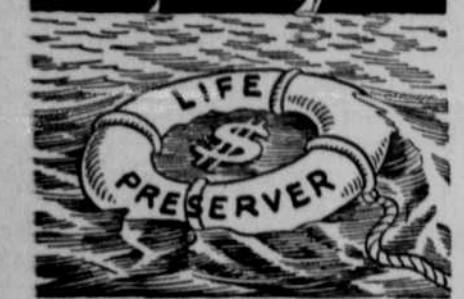
