NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO VOTE ON ISSUANCE OF BONDS

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of The School District of City of O'Neill, in the County of Holt, in the State of Nebraska, that by vote of more than two-thirds of the members of the Board of Education of said School District an election is hereby called and shall be held at the regular polling places in the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, in said School District in the County of Holt, in the State of Nebraska, on the 23rd day of August, A. D., 1938, between the hours of nine o'clock A. M. and seven o'clock P. M., at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of said School District the following proposition:

"Shall the Board of Education of The School District of City of O'Neill, in the County of Holt, in the State of Nebraska, issue the bonds of said School District in the amount of \$30,000.00, bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed five per cent per annum, interest payable annually, bonds to be retired in not to exceed twenty years, said bonds to be dated November 1st, A. D., 1938, and

Shall the Board of Education of said School District cause to be levied annually against the taxable property in said School District a tax sufficient for the payment of the interest and principal of said bonds, as the same become due. The proceeds of said bonds, together with funds on hand belonging to said District and with a grant of funds from the United States Government, to be used for the purpose of constructing and furnishing a building in said School District, to be used for school purposes; for the purchase and installation of a heating system and for altering and improving the building now being used for school purposes in said District, the total cost of such projects to be \$85,000.00."

The ballots to be voted upon and cast at said election shall have printed the foregoing proposition, and in addition thereto the following:

FOR said bond issue and said annual tax levy
AGAINST said bond issue and said annual tax levy

Voters who desire to vote in favor of said proposition will indicate the same by marking an X in the square following the words "FOR said bond issue and said annual tax levy." Voters who desire to vote against said proposition will indicate the same by marking an X in the square following the words "AGAINST said bond issue and said annual tax levy."
