**Obituary**  
Elliott R. Riley, son of Joseph and Clarissa Riley was born in Fayette, Wisconsin, March 2nd, 1858, and passed away at his home in Inman, October 8, 1938, at the age of 80 years, 7 months and 6 days.

At the age of 22 he, with his parents left Wisconsin and came to Inman in the fall of 1880, the trip being made in a covered wagon.

Mr. Riley took a homestead five miles south of Inman, on which place he resided for 48 years. In 1929, he retired and moved into Inman where he has since resided.

On October 11, 1893, he was united in marriage to Miss Juila Weingartner at Sioux City, Iowa. Shortly after he with his bride went via covered wagon to Texas where they lived for about three years, after which they returned to Nebraska and again took up their residence on the homestead.

To this union were born three children, Joseph Preston of Na-

tional City, California; Mrs. Mildred Alexander and Mrs. Lena Bartsch of Royal, Nebraska.

While yet very young he was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal church. Mr. Riley was a man of deep convictions and lived a conscientious christian life. He was a strong supporter of the church and served as an official until his death, being a trustee at the time of his passing. His council and help was always freely given, and his fellow members were always ready to rely upon his judgement. Although he had been in frail health for several years he had never lost faith in his church nor lost interest in its well fare. His last attendance being on Easter Sunday when he was present to see two of his grandchildren consecrated to the Lord in Baptism. His faith was his strong reliance during the last long illness. Besides being active in his church, Mr. Riley served as member of the school board for many years.

He was a devoted and loving husband and father always kind and patient and sacrificing for his family and friends.

For many months Mr. Riley has been in frail health and on May 11, 1938, he suffered a fall, severely injuring his hip, since that time he was bedfast. Although he suffered severely at times he was always patient and uncomplaining and appreciative of all that was being done to relieve him. He has fought the good fight, he has kept the faith, he has endured to the end.
