The only thing he could think of at the moment was a restoration of sales taxes on food and clothing; euphemistically called "processing taxes," which the bad old Supreme Court had invalidated.

processing taxes—that was the stuff. But the farmers could not figure out how that would help them. Then someone remembered that two years ago Marse Henry's Bureau of Agricultural Economics had reported that the former so-called "processing taxes" had not been paid by the processors but had been deducted from the prices paid to the farmers or were passed along to the consumers.

Henry Drops Hot Potato
So Marse Henry decided to drop that hot potato. But he had another idea—and they came to him just like that! Why, said he, we'll establish for farm products a two-price system—both for domestic consumption. One will be higher than the other and will be paid directly to the farmer by—well, by those who will pay it. The other price will be less, with the government making up the difference to the farmer.

"If there is to be any dumping of surplus farm products, it will be done at home to help the lower one-third of our people rather than foreign countries," heroically exclaimed Marse Henry, completely ignoring the fact that only a month previously he had approved government subsidies for dumping wheat in foreign countries.

By the time this is being read Marse Henry undoubtedly will have proclaimed still another scheme for the salvation of agriculture. He probably will want to forget about his grandiloquent domestic "two price" plan, because by the time these remarks are published he will find out that instead of a hot potato on his hands, this time he has a big, Bengal tiger by the tail. Not even Rexford Tugwell in his balmy days ever thought up a more idiotic, screwy idea than this one.

Marse Henry may not be sound but he is funny and that is a contribution when all the other New Dealers act like they are attending a wake.
