The future prosperity of both the farmers and the towns of Holt county depend on the prosperity of our only industry—agriculture. The better agricultural training that is given in our boys and girls now, the better chance for prosperity in Holt county in the future. Can we afford to neglect that education now?

Holt county has had an average of 250 boys and girls in constructive agricultural and home economic project in recent years. Many of these clubs are reorganizing now for next year's work. New clubs are also requesting organization. Can Holt county voters deny these farmers and girls the opportunity of continuing their education? The future of our county is dependent on our boys and girls. Is anything to help them make better farmers and homemakers to be denied?

Our former 4-H club members are numbered among our outstanding farmers and business men. Scores of them are enrolled in our universities and colleges.

The Agricultural Extension Service, a division of the College of Agriculture, furnishes us an agriculturally trained man, provided Holt county will furnish an office. Can Holt county voters afford to vote other than "YES?"

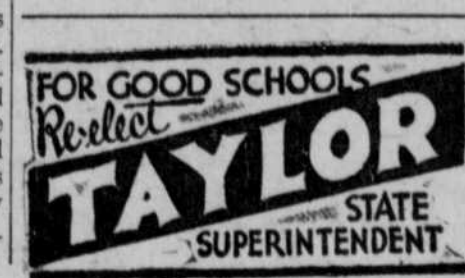

3. Secured drought freight rates which saved Holt county thousands of dollars.
