Nicholas Oberlee

Nicholas Oberlee died at his home near Verdigre last Thursday afternoon at 5:50 p.m., at the age of 78 years, 2 months and 6 days. Funeral services were held at the home last Sunday afternoon and burial in the Riverside cemetery at Verdigre.

Deceased was born in Jackson county, Illinois, on February 14, 1868. In 1884, at the age of 16, he came with his parents to Holt county where he grew to manhood and on March 1, 1891, he was united in marriage to Miss Lavine Tamm. After their marriage he and his wife settled on a farm in Holt county, where they resided continuously until his death.

Mr. Oberlee was one of the pioneers of northeastern Holt and was well known to all of the old timers in that section of the county. Even after he moved to Knox county he never quite gave up his love for Holt and was a frequent visitor of relatives and friends in this county.
