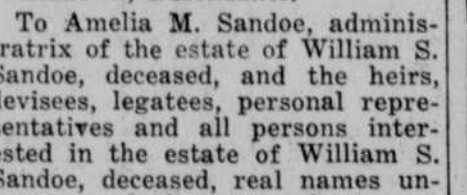

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE

An Ordinance of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska to Amend Section Six (6) of Ordinance No. 190 A. of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska relating to the consent of adjacent property owners for construction of filling station tanks and underground storage.

To Provide that the consent of 60 per cent of adjacent property owners be required, and to Repeal Said Original Section.

Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of O'Neill, Nebraska.

Section 1. That section Six (6) of Ordinance No. 190 A. of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

Underground tanks shall be constructed of galvanized iron or steel of ample gauge and thickness and shall be thoroughly coated on the outside with tar or other rust resisting material best adapted to the soil in which such tanks are placed. All tanks, containers and structures used for the storage of gasoline, kerosene or other volatile liquids or oils in quantities more than fifty (50) gallons shall be built not less than 200 feet from any house or building, except by special permission of 60 per cent of all persons, firms, corporations or individuals owning real estate within such area.

Section 2. That section 6 of Ordinance No. 190 A. of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as required by law.
