Storz New Beer Fast Gaining Popularity The popularity of Storz draught beer in half gallon picnic bottles has led to another development, the packing of Storz Pasteurized beer in these big bottles. Whereas the draught beer has to be kept cold from the time it is purchased until it is used, the pasteurized beer can be kept any place until near the time it is to be used and then cooled to the proper temper- ature. Also, pasteurized beer will not spoil if it gets warm again after once having been cooled but can be re-cooled when necessary. This is not advisable with draught beer.
