ORDINANCE NO. 191-A

An Ordinance providing for "the Annual Appropriation Bill" of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, for the fiscal year commencing the first Tuesday in May, 1939, and ending the first Tuesday in May 1940.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'NEILL, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That the corporate authorities do hereby appropriate the following sums of money which are deemed necessary to defray all expenses and liabilities of the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, during the fiscal year beginning on the first Tuesday in May, 1939, and ending on the first Tuesday in May, 1940.
