Report

We, the undersigned, householders residing within the City of O'Neill, Nebraska, namely: Seth Noble, Tom Enright, Joe Mann, R. E. Tomlinson and Anton Toy, having been heretofore appointed by the Mayor and City Council of O'Neill, Nebraska, to appraise and assess the damages, if any, to the property and owners thereof in the vacating of the following alley situated within the City of O'Neill,

Nebraska.

The alley which runs through and dissects Block 21 of the Original Town of O'Neill, Nebraska, which runs between the South 22½ feet of Lots 1, 2, 3, and 4 in said Block, and Lot 31 of said Block, and which runs from east to west.

We hereby certify that within five days after notice of our appointment we took oath, same being duly administered to us, that each would faithfully and impartially discharge the duties of our office and faithfully and impartially make an assessment and appraisal of the damages, if any, suffered by the owner or owners of the property abutting on or adjacent to the above described alley in the vacation thereof. That on the 11th day of August, 1939, said oath was administered to us and on the same day we, in a body together, personally viewed and inspected the premises and returned to the office of James P. Materials for Paper-Making

Practically any cellulose-fiber material can be made into paper. The first paper—it was invented by the Chinese in 105 A. The Name Myrtle

Some varieties grow here and some are vines. In ancient Greece the myrtle was sacred to Venus and its leaves were used to fashion crowns of victory.
