His early life was spent in Sullivan County, Missouri, where, in the year 1887, he was united in marriage to Miss Mattie Smart. To this union three children were born of whom, one son, Hardin C., survives.

In 1903 he was united in marriage to Mrs. Louise Williams. To this union two children, Mrs. Emma Conard and Helyn Anspach,

were born.

When but 21 years of age he joined the I. O. O. F. Lodge since which time he had been a faithful member of that order. He was also an official member of the M. E. church, being a trustee, and being re-elected to that office on Aug. 20th.

For a number of years Mr. Anspach followed the carpenter trade, but on account of failing health and the loss of a limb he was forced to lighter work. He then operated a produce station until a few years prior to his death.

Mr. Anspach came to Inman from Brainard, Butler County, Nebr., about 30 years ago, consequently he was well known and had many friends here. He leaves to mourn his departure, his widow, Mrs. Louise Anspach, one son, Hardin, of Inman; two daughters, Mrs. John Conard, of Emmet and Miss Helyn, of Inman, also four grand children, Richard, Keith, and Oneita Anspach and Mary Lou Conard and number of brothers and sisters.
