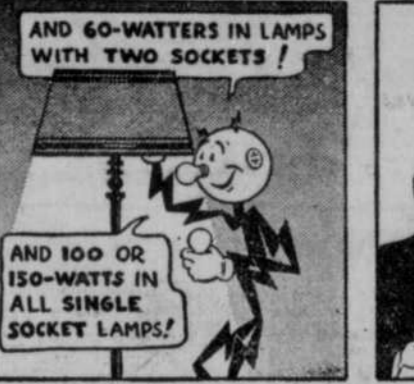
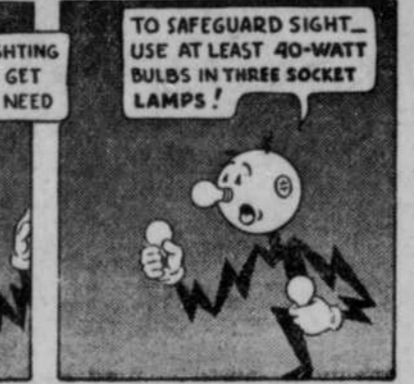
Charles and Frank Daley, of Omaha, spent the week-end here visiting at the home of their mother, Mrs. William Dailey.
