C. E. Alter of Alma stated that he is now "1 per cent more in favor of running for gov- ernor." Recently Mr. Alter said he was 95 per cent interested. Now he admits, the ratio is 96 per cent.

Irrigation in Nebraska received a boost last week when a meeting of farmers was held at Schuyler to boom the demands of central and eastern Nebraska. Delegations from Cass and Sarpy counties, repre- senting the Ak-Sar-Ben Public Power and Irrigation district, called on Dr. G. E. Condra and State Engineer Tilley. Word has been received that 18 million will be available for irrigation and power projects. Funds for the Republi- can valley will be available as soon as power generation is added to the plans already outlined. From New York comes the news that the national grid plan of power distrib- ution has been adopted by eastern holding companies. In order to

conserve fuel supplies hydroelec- trics will be encouraged.

C. S. Smrha, director of the state insurance department, has request- ed that the receivership of the Lin- coln Hail Insurance company be closed, and final hearing will be held November 13. District Judge Broady has sent notification to loss claimants that the receivership is about to end.

School dis- tricts are prohibited from spend- ing money raised by taxation in such ways.
