
Mother Takes Witness Stand Before Dies Committee Germany's Guns Face West Towards 'No Man's Land' OUT OF SOR





As British Merchant Ships Swarm the Seven Seas



Swarming over the seven seas on any given day are 1,545 British merchant ships, easy prey for Nazi submarines. Another 705 British merchantmen are in foreign ports on the same day. As vital to British lifelines as her navy, the cargo-carrying vessels cruise over 90,000 miles of ocean and sea lanes. To peace-time England the merchant fleet carries almost 48 per cent of all her food. Today it must bring the same food, plus teel, oil, guns, planes and war essentials.
