They have issued to date about 3,300 licenses, being about 450 ahead of this time last year, but still have approximately 2,700 to go, which means that a lot of Holt County residents still haven't purchased their 1940 license plates. According to the law, all motorists should have their new plates not later than January 31, of each new year.
