THE ART OF CARVING PORK LOIN

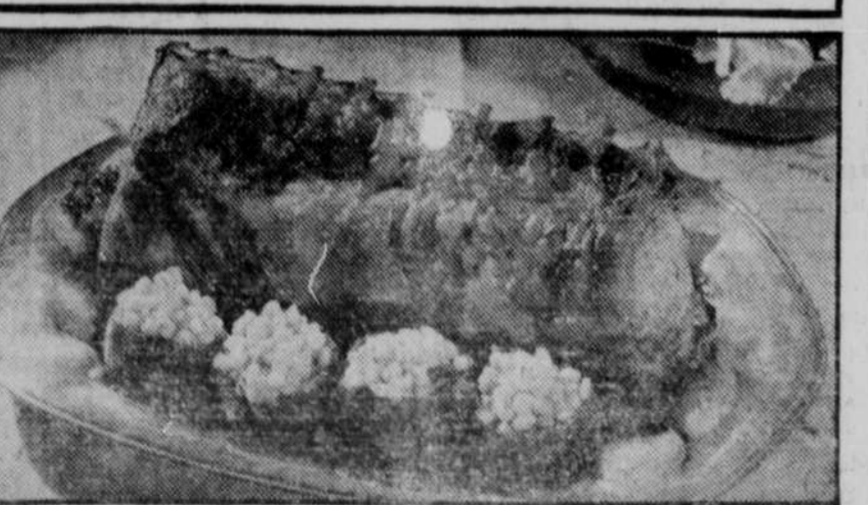


Diagram showing three steps for carving a pork loin. 1. Note how the backbone has become loosened during cooking. The roast has been placed on a carving board, so that the backbone may be removed before the roast is placed on the platter. 2. Just one sweep of the knife will sever the backbone from roast. 3. Here is the roast on the platter in the correct position for the carver. The ribs, you see, are toward him where they will serve as guide to the direction the knife should take. The carver should hold the roast steady by inserting the fork in the top as shown in the illustration. Roast pork is more tempting if the slices are cut thin. The carver cuts close against both sides of each rib. Every other slice will be boneless. If the loin is small, the slice will be thin enough if the cut is made between each pair of ribs—then every slice will contain a rib. With a large loin, two boneless slices may be cut between ribs.

Working for the preservation and restoration of our wildlife resources is an agency known as the National Wildlife Federation, which is attempting to co-ordinate the opinions of these 11,000,000 sportsmen. Nebraska is a member. The Nebraska Wildlife Federation is an integral part of the national group. And because it is a dominant factor, Nebraska officers of the federation are asking all Nebraskans to rally to the defense of wildlife by observing National Wildlife Week March 17 to 23. The federation exists only thru the support of individual sportsmen through their purchase of wildlife stamps. There are no paid officers in Nebraska. There are only two in the national headquarters in Washington, D. C. Receipts from the stamp sales are divided on a 50-50 basis—half to the national office; half to the state organization. These funds make it possible to campaign for favorable legislation, legislation that will have far-reaching effects on the nation's and the state's wildlife resources. The federation builds for tomorrow and in the short time it has been operative, has worked successfully for the passage of such beneficial bills as the Pittman-Robertson act which gave to Nebraska \$30,000 in 1939 for conservation projects. There will be approximately \$50,000 available to Nebraska in 1940 from this federal aid fund. Here in Nebraska the Federation was instrumental in obtaining the two state game farms, worked for the passage of the increased game permit bill which enabled Nebraska

to raise the money to meet federal aid funds. Nebraskans in the Federation now are campaigning for the Mundt Anti-pollution bill which will mean clean streams with no sewage; for a permanent national appropriation for tree planting activity, and for a citizens' committee which will be of real service to the Nebraska game and fish commission when help is needed. The wildlife stamps, arranged in four blocks of 25 stamps each, are in natural colors. They may be purchased from your local representative of the Federation, Hardware Stores, Sporting Goods Stores, etc., in your town or from the Nebraska Wildlife Federation, state headquarters, 1700 South 24th Street, Lincoln.
