Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Duffy, of Jackson, Minn., returned to their home on Monday, after spending the week here visiting relatives.

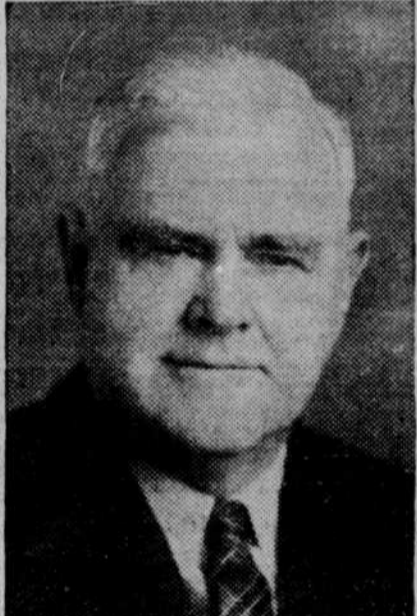
