and said application has been approved by said City Council for his present location on Lot 7, Block 21, of the Original City of O'Neill.

And, whereas the said Lod Janousek has a lease on said premises which will expire on August 22, 1940, and the rules of the Nebraska Liquor Commission require that a licensee must have a lease for the entire period of the license.

And, whereas the said Lod Janousek now has a lease on Lot 8, Block 16 of the Original City of O'Neill from August 22, 1940 to May 1, 1941 and has exhibited a copy of the same to the City Council and to the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission and said premises are suitable and proper for the conduct of a beer parlor.

Now, Therefore Be It Resolved by the City Council of O'Neill, Nebraska, that it is the will and desire of said Council that a license be granted to the said Lod Janousek, to sell beer at retail in the premises known and described as Lot 7, Block 21 of the Original Town of O'Neill until August 22, 1940, and that it be given permission to move his place of business on said date to Lot 8, in Block 16 of the Original Town of O'Neill.

Be it Further Resolved that the City Clerk of O'Neill be and he hereby is directed to forward a copy of this resolution containing the signature of the Mayor and City Clerk to the Nebraska Liquor Commission at Lincoln, Nebraska.

Motion by Phalin, seconded by McNally, that the above resolution be adopted. Roll was called on the above resolution and the vote thereon was as follows: Aye, Uhl, Miles, Phalin, Yantzi, Lindberg, McNally; Nay, None.

Upon motion the Council adjourned subject to the call of the Mayor.

THE DAYS OF LONG AGO

Fifty-Five Years Ago

The Frontier, May 14, 1885

Yesterday afternoon and evening was a gala day for O'Neill. About 1 o'clock a detachment of the Fifth regiment, Companies B and K, marched into town from the west, pitching their tents on the river banks south of town. There were about 180 soldiers in all, as many horses and about 60 mules besides drivers, etc., all under the command of Col. E. V. Summers. They were on their way to Fort Reno, Indian Territory, colored troops of the Ninth infantry taking their place at Fort Niobrara.

The Frontier, May 21, 1885

Ezra Saunderson's mother, brother Grant, and little sister have arrived from Wisconsin and will make this county their future home. We welcome them to Holt county.

The mammoth livery and feed barn of Weekes & Beebe was formally opened this week. The main building is 28x80, with a shed on the east side 16x80, both of which are under the same roof.

Fifty Years Ago

The Frontier, May 8, 1890

Monday night there was quite a heavy frost but fruit was not damaged to any great extent.

There was very little building going on in O'Neill Monday, the carpenters having struck for higher wages, but Tuesday the difficulty was satisfactorily adjusted and everything is lovely.

Tuesday O'Neill was a prohibition town, not from choice, however, but from necessity. The licenses of the numerous saloons expired Monday and the City Council at their meeting that night failed to take action on the matter, consequently the shops had to close their doors.

The Frontier, May 15, 1890

The foundation is laid for the new building of the Elkhorn Valley bank.

M. Meehan, son of the gentleman who was here some time since visiting Ed F. Gallagher, is in O'Neill and employed in the First National Bank.

About the busiest man in O'Neill the past week has been W. D. Mathews, who has succeeded in organizing a new bank for O'Neill, the name of which shall be The State Bank of O'Neill. The authorized capital will be \$100,000, paid up capital \$30,000 and to begin business June 2, 1890. The incorporators are: W. D. Mathews, Bernard Mullen, M. D. Long, John McBride, G. C. Hazelett, S. J. Weekes, E. W. Adams, W. J. Canton, Neil Brennan, E. Kinch, A. U. Morris, John J. McCafferty, R. R. Dickson, A. B. Charde, J. L. Hershiser, Arthur Mullen, E. J. Mack, G. W. Wattles and M. C. McEvony.

At the adjourned meeting of the Council last Saturday the deadlock which existed for about a week was broken by the appointment of John Lappan as chief of police and the granting of license to the four old saloons.

The marriage of Miss Stella Stout and Ed Latta, of Tekamah, Neb., was solemnized at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. J. P. Gilligan on Wednesday morning at 8:30.

Died Wednesday, May 2, 1890, at his residence five miles west of O'Neill, James Ryan. He is survived by his wife and nine children.

The Frontier, May 19, 1910

Thomas Donlin has commenced the erection of a residence on Fourth Street, north of the Catholic church.

Last Monday the citizens of O'Neill voted bonds in the sum of \$16,000 for the construction of a sewerage system in the city. The vote for the bonds 190, against 62. The contract for the addition to St. Mary's Academy will be let this week and work will commence on the building within ten days. The addition will be 87x115 feet, the same height as the present building.

The Frontier, May 15, 1930
