discussed by Mrs. A. E. Sammons. Here we find that I. D. Bliss kept the first post office in 1886, walking to O'Neill at times and carrying the mail sack on his back. The improvement of roads was mentioned at this time.

"When were the first telephones installed?" was answered jointly by Mrs. Ernst White and Mrs. Fred Watson.

The program closed with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

A large display of articles, reminiscent of the early days, was shown. Among these things an Amelia Journal, edited in 1891 by H. Parsons and B. Knight, occasioned a great deal of interest. Pictures showing earliest sod shanties, hay burners and other objects were displayed along with homespun material and clothing of those times.
