## A New Device Measures

Before joining the faculty of the department of secondary education, Dr. Rosenlof was director of secondary education and teacher training for the Nebraska State Department of Public Instruction. He holds degrees from Hastings College, the University of Nebraska, and Columbia University.

Dr. Rosenlof is a member of the National Educational Association, the Nebraska Schoolmasters Club, the American Educational Research Association, and the educational planning commission of the Nebraska State Teachers Association.
