Brewing Industry Enters Third Year of Self-Regulation in Nebraska

Two years ago the Self-Regulatory program of the Nebraska Brewers and Beer Distributors Committee was launched as an experiment entirely new in the history of American industry.

Today, as the Committee begins its third year of activity, the experiment has been proved a vital force in maintaining beer's position on a sound social basis. Under the guidance of Charles E. Sandall, the program in Nebraska became so practically effective as to cause the same Self-Regulation program to be installed in 12 other states under the sponsorship of the United Brewers Industrial Foundation.

At this time the Committee and Mr. Sandall renew the pledge made two years ago to assist the efficient Nebraska Liquor Control Commission and local law enforcement officials in eliminating the small minority of law-violating retail beer dealers.
