Interesting Test Plots Are Located in Holt County

Many farmers who are undecided as to the advisability of the use of certain varieties of hybrid corn or which type of grain and forage sorghums to use under local conditions will be interested in inspecting various test plots carried on under the supervision of county agent, Lyndle R. Stout, in cooperation with local farmers.
Located on the farm of Joe Judge east of Atkinson on Highway 20, are test plots of each hybrid corn and sorghums growing beside each

other under actual field conditions. In addition a sorghum test plot is located on the George Hartford farm one mile north of O'Neill and a hybrid test is available on the Fred Lindberg farm about four miles east of Midway.
These tests afford interested parties an opportunity to get some first hand information on the adaptability of each variety under local rainfall and conditions.

O'Neill Boy on Bicycle Runs Into Side of Car

Last Friday evening about six-thirty, Gene Wilkerson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Wilkerson of this city, received a severe concussion of the brain, when the bicycle he was riding crashed into a car at the intersection by the Ford garage. Holt County Calf Show and Sale Here Monday September 30

Plans for the 4th annual stocker feeder show and sale which is to be held at the O'Neill Sale Pavilion on Monday, September 30, are pointing to the best show and sale which has ever been held in this part of Nebraska.
The show and sale, which are sponsored by the O'Neill Lion's Club in cooperation with the Holt County Farm Bureau, O'Neill business men and the O'Neill Sale management is organized for the purpose of advertising the cattle industry in Holt county, encouraging the raising of better quality cattle, and encouraging 4-H club work among our boys and girls.
Liberal premiums have been provided by the Lions Club and the O'Neill business men and little doubt has remained in the minds of those attending in previous years as to the success of the event. The show will be divided into a 4-H Club class and a commercial class with calves being shown individually in the 4-H class and in lots of singles and five in the commercial class. Mr. R. R. The sale which will be handled in the regular manner will be the first of a series of shows and sales in connection with Bassett and Ainsworth.
